COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES.

We understand that the teachers
county institute will not be held
during the Chautauqua at Ashland.

An entertainment in district 11,
at the close of the term last week
was a success. The teacher Clara
Richardson has taught there two
terms and is wanted again.

Schools that have closed recently
are those in charge of Maggie Miller,
Cora Lemon, Lila Sackett, Clara
Poley, Frances Barnes and Carl
VonderHellen.

J. H. Horton of Jacksonville will
attend to the duties of County Su-
perintendent until the first Monday
in August when the term of the
new superintendent will begin.

Preparations are under way which
will insure a most successful year
in the Normal at Ashland. Two
new teachers in the faculty and the
boarding department in experienced
hands will await the many students
planning to enter in September.

The next teachers' institute
should be the best in the history of
the county for there is on hand
\$110.15 institute fund and this will
be increased by the August teachers'
examination, \$65.60 was the ex-
pense of the institute, held in Med-
ford last year.

There are according to the reports
of school clerks, 5035 school chil-
dren between four and twenty years
of age in the county. This is an
increase of 176 over last year.

We have now received assurance
that the new teachers registers are
to be completed in the near future.
Probably they will be in readiness
for the fall term. Several districts
are now keeping records on blank
paper and these should be copied
into new registers.

June 22 saw the close of a good
year's work in the Woodville school
under the care of Misses Merritt
and Newton.

With this week "County School
Notes," under the present manage-
ment will close. For two years we
have tried to give items of interest
to teachers and school officers and
occasionally something for the gen-
eral public. We thank the county
press for the uniform courtesy ex-
tended us in this effort. The hearty
co-operation of teachers and patrons
has made the two years of service a
pleasure and given evidence that
the people of Jackson County, wish
the best schools possible for their
children. There is plenty of hard
work for the future in order to place
our rural school where they should
be and we trust that every true
teacher and patriotic citizen will
help on the good work. Yours for

Outstanding city warrants to the
amount of \$2000 were called in by
Roseburg Monday.

Judge O. N. Denny, one of the
best known public men in Oregon,
died Saturday, at Long Beach,
Wash., aged 62 years.

From 400 head of sheep Dick
Kiger has sheared and sold 3600
pounds of wool, or an average of
nine pounds per head.

Bids are being solicited for the
erection of a two story brick hotel
in Lakeview. The owners will be
Miller & Lane, who paid \$2500 for
a site last week.

Near Warm Springs Indian reser-
vation a herd of 200 elk has been
discovered. Unless proper precau-
tion are taken, the Indians will kill
a number of the animals.

The Oregon Railroad and Navi-
gation company has announced
that beginning July 1 it will in-
augurate a 3-cent per mile passen-
ger rate on its lines in Oregon and
Washington.

Fred R. Neil and Guy Hamakar
made a record run on their bicycles
between Klamath Falls and Ash-
land Thursday. They covered the
distance of 60 miles in eight hours,
which included about 15 miles of
walking over the mountains.—Tid-
ings.

A Pacific Coast Indian Institute
is to be organized. A conference of
educators interested in the training
and education of Indians will take
place at Chemawa, August 14 to 19.
Washington, Montana, Idaho and
California will be represented, and
perhaps several other Western
states.

A proposition for the location of
a flax-fiber mill at Eugene has been
submitted by E. Larimore, manager
of the Scio factory. The bonus is
\$2500 in cash, 24 acres of land for
a site, and 1500 acres in flax. It
is represented that the plant will
cost \$25,000, and will employ regu-
larly about 30 hands.

Gov. T. T. Geer Monday received
a letter from Rev. F. L. Young,
pastor of the First M. E. church, of
Baker City, in which that gentle-
man applies for the position of
chaplain in the first regiment of
volunteers going from Oregon to
China, in the event that volunteers
are called for and war between the
United States and China become a
fact.

France has 14.05 soldiers per 1000
of population, Germany 11.05, Italy
7.01, Turkey 7.01, Austria-Hungary
6.07, Russia 6.01, Great Britain 5.06
and the United States 0.86. We
have 65,000 men in service. Our
increase over 25,000 is only tempo-
rary, and the law authorizing it
will expire July 1, 1901.

BRYAN AND STEVENSON

Were Nominated for President and Vice-
President at the Kansas City Con-
vention on Friday.

Kansas City, July 6.—Hon. W.
J. Bryan was unanimously nomi-
nated for president here amid great
enthusiasm. For vice-president,
Adali Stevenson was nominated,
receiving on first ballot 55½ votes
against 89½ for Town and 176 for
Hill with several other scattering
candidates. Mr. Stevenson was
vice-president during Grover Cleve-
land's last term as president. The
platform adopted, puts "anti-im-
perialism" in the foreground with
16 to 1 also an issue for the 1900
campaign.

In China there are three times as
many Roman Catholic Christians
as there are of all Protestant denomi-
nations taken together. The Cath-
olics have 1,000,000 adherents, and
thirty bishoprics, while no one esti-
mates the number of Protestant ad-
herents at over 300,000. But the
Roman Catholic Church began its
work in China hundreds of years
before the Protestants began theirs
—long, indeed, before the Protes-
tant movement known as the Ref-
ormation.

It seems probable that other Min-
isters of State to China besides the
German representative, and possi-
bly many, if not nearly all, the rep-
resentatives of foreign governments,
have been murdered in Peking. If
so, the Chinese Government has
made its destruction sure. The
various powers interested can take
no other course except to mete out
to China a fitting and terrible pun-
ishment. But to do this promises
to be a very difficult and expensive
task. Already the Chinese have a
large army, that cannot be over-
come by the foreign forces in China,
between Tien Tsin and Peking.
This army will grow larger, and
may amount to a quarter of a
million men or more before the
powers can gather together suffi-
cient forces to attack it successfully.
They will need 100,000 men for this
purpose, and they may need two or
three times this number before
China is purged of its horrible
crimes against humanity. Its
government cannot escape; if these
murders have been committed, no
apologies or protests or excuses will
avail. The whole civilized world
will be aflame with the red light of
vengeful ire; and in the demolition
and destruction that must be
wrought the United States must do
its part and bear its share.
