the Fall crop.

Wallowa County has issued war-
rants for 1089 coyote scalps, aggre-
gating \$2178. The Chieftan says
the bounty law has greatly benefit-
ed Wallowa County, and that stock-
men report great decrease in the
depredation of "varmints."

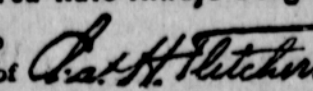
The Jacksonville Times reports

Four boys died in Boston recent-

wounds received during the Bunker
Hill celebration of June 17.

The United States department of
agriculture states that there were
13,537,524 horses in this country at
the beginning of January, and that
the value of the horses had increas-
ed \$7.21 per head on an average.

Farmer's Guide says that 5,000
of the 17,000 farmers in Kansas are
women. The young women, particu-
larly, are taking great interest in
these matters, and are regular at
tendants at the dairy and other agri-
cultural meetings.

Election to the Presidency in the
early days of the Government seems
to have been conducive to longevity.

73; John Quincy Adams, 80; An-
drew Jackson, 78, and Martin Van
Buren, 79.

Porto Rican imports during eight
months ending with February,
amounted to \$6,793,575, of which
\$2,000,000 worth were admitted
free of duty. Exports during the
same period were \$3,198,396. The
United States leads any other coun-
try in the matter of imports by
more than \$1,600,000.

It is said that there are about
4,900 cheese factories in the United
States, in addition to several hun-
dred creameries making cheese in
small quantities. The total out-
put of cheese last year was 265,000,
000 pounds. Of this about 76,
000,000 pounds were produced in
New York state.—New York Com-
mercial.

The Commissioner of Pensions
announces that 105,567 certificates
for pensions were issued by the
bureau during the fiscal year, which
closed June 30, or 15,000 more than
were issued during the year 1899.
They were divided as follows: 40,
637 were original issue, 4352 were
restorations, and 60,578 were for
increases, re-ratings, accrued and
additional.

The Dallas Chronicle says that
not only are the harvesters busy
nowadays, but the orchardists are
employing numerous packers in
the attempt to dispose of their fruit
to the best advantage. Peach plums
are an enormous crop, and so rapidly
are they ripening that it is not
an easy job to keep them packed
and in good shape for shipment.
Many young women of The Dalles
are employed as packers.

A little boy about 8 years old,
son of Henry Hagadoyn, near Mon-
tague, had his arms badly bitten
and chewed by a hog at their ranch
last Tuesday, and would have been
killed had not his screams brought
his mother to the rescue, says the
Ashland Record. Boy-like, he
went into the hog pen to catch one
of the little five weeks old pigs, and
succeeded, but the sow made a
vicious attack in defense of her
little ones.

Nebraska in 1897 paid \$19,000,
000 on mortgages, in 1898, \$49,
000,000 and in 1899, \$76,000,000.
This is a total on mortgage indebt-
edness paid amounting to \$146,000,
000. The amount of mortgages in
force both on acres and lots in Ne-
braska in 1890 was \$176,000,000,
so that the payments made in the
past three years have reached a sum
of only \$30,000,000 less than the
total mortgage indebtedness of the
state 10 years ago. In addition,
the farm lands of the state have
doubled in value.

Of the 640 girls who passed suc-
cessfully the examinations to the
New York Normal College, the
great majority are Jews. More
than five-sixths of the number
came from the public schools of
New York City, of which for many
years the best scholars have been
chiefly of that race. Of about 800
graduates from the New York City
public schools admitted to the free
city college for boys, the vast ma-
jority are also of the Jewish race.
The New York Sun notes these
facts, and says that the supply of
teachers and for the professions is
coming largely from the Jewish
race. Jews are also now a notable
part of the students of our great
universities.

M'KINLEY IN DANGER

A Spanish and Cuban Plot to Assassinate
Our President.

NEW YORK, July 11.—The World
says:

"A plot to assassinate President
McKinley has been frustrated. It
was concocted by a group of Span-
ish and Cuban conspirators who
had headquarters in New York.

"One of the plotters weakened
and sent a warning letter to a mem-
ber of the Republican National
Committee. The letter was placed
in the hands of Secretary Charles
Dick, who referred it to Chairman
Odell, of the New York state com-
mittee, for investigation. Chair-
man Odell engaged a detective,
who speedily verified certain al-
legations made in the warning letter.
Thereupon Mr. Odell reported to
Secretary Dick, who laid the facts
before Chairman Mark Hanna.

"Mr. Odell's report caused great
alarm among the President's close
friends and advisers. Mr. Odell
made it plain that he regarded the
plot as a matter of the utmost seri-
ousness, and urged that extreme
precautions be taken to keep the
President out of harm's reach."

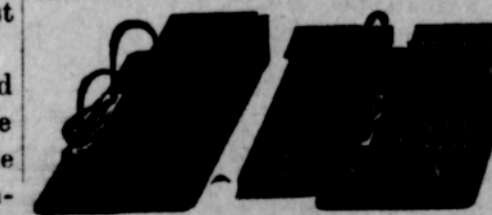
"Messrs. Dick and Hanna laid
the whole matter before the Presi-
dent before he departed for Canton.
They instructed Mr. Odell to con-
tinue his investigation, and caution-
ed him to work with the utmost
secrecy.

"To a World reporter last night
Mr. Odell admitted that he and cer-
tain members of the National com-
mittee had discovered a plot to as-
sassinate the President.

"Yes, it is true," he said, "but I
regret exceedingly that the matter
has become public."

"He was extremely anxious that
no reference whatever should be
made to the matter. Special detec-
tives are guarding the President in
Canton."
