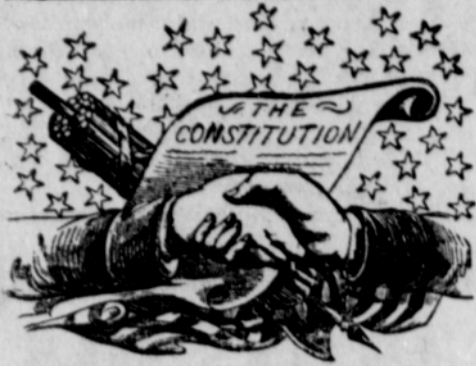

The racial tie between Spain and Cuba for 400 years was the chain of slavery and the Cubans are not fools enough to want to cultivate that again after America has cut it.

The president has again disproved the assertions of those who declare that he is a weak man and an opportunist, simply because he will not rush in like certain people of whom we have all heard. His action in China was taken at exactly the right time and was bold and striking. The United States will have troops on hand to protect its citizens and interests earlier, and by greater force, than any other

country except Russia, which is, of course an Asiatic power itself.

Two years ago the Silver Republicans declared free coinage was paramount, and announced their support of expansion. Now they find their Democratic allies declaring anti-expansion paramount. It is time for the last one of them to come home from the Democratic wilderness.—Boise Statesman.

The oldest living recipient of an honorary degree from Harvard is ex-Governor George S. Boutwell, of Massachusetts, who received the LL. D. degree in 1851, when it was the custom to so honor the Governor of the state, a custom which stopped with the election of Benjamin F. Butler.
