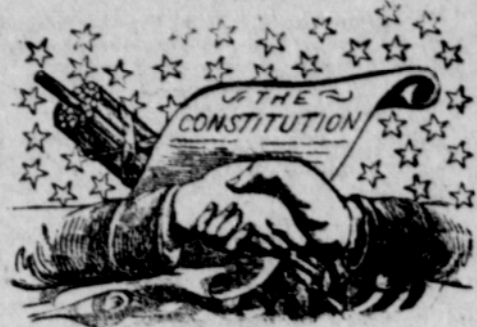

Last Wednesday morning the editor was up for the early train, and could not help noticing the stench arising from the dirty alleys and back yards in our city. It is no wonder we have so much malaria in our town. The city authorities should take the matter in their hands and see to it that our town is kept clean. It would not only help the looks of the town, but will make it that much healthier.

Dr. Charlton T. Lewis, a vice-president of the "Anti-Imperialist League," says that "imperialism" is not the supreme issue, despite the declaration of the Kansas City platform. The supreme issue, he says, lies in the character of the Bryan party, of which he presents this estimate:

The like of the Bryan party has not been seen since the days of the Mountain in 1703 and the Paris Commune of 1871. Bryan stands for the same thing that the French Revolution stood for. He is not a political leader; he is a revolutionist; and the crowd that he leads has no respect for law, no respect for our National institutions, no respect for social order. Instead of improving in four years, I think that the democracy has decidedly retrogressed; the leadership of the Kansas City convention was on a much lower plane, if that were possible, than that of 1896.—Ex.

There was ample warning of the uprising in China against foreigners. Extracts are reprinted from the North China Herald, of last February, in which this outbreak was clearly and fully predicted. That paper then said: "The whole country from the Yellow river to the Great wall and beyond will be a blaze of insurrection, which will drive every foreigner out of Pekin and Tien Tsun, under con-

dition which it is not difficult to foresee." A native Chinaman sent to the same paper a letter which contained this statement: "I write you in all seriousness and sincerity to inform you that there is a great scheme, having for its aim to crush all foreigners in China and wrest back the territories leased to them." There has been a prodigious importation of arms into China, in preparation for this effort, chiefly from Germany; and now the nations are to "go up against" the consequences of this greed of commerce.

There is little doubt in the minds of the majority of the citizens of Gold Hill, that the sending of "simple minded" James Wyatt, to the State Insane Asylum was a rank piece of work, and done simply to graft the county. It is the opinion of a number, that the boy is no more insane than the gentleman who escorted him to Salem. It is true the boy has not the strongest mind in Jackson county; but it is known that the boy is not insane. If the boy was sent on the evidence as related to a News reporter: Simply because "his mother was afraid of him" and because "he drew a large butcher knife on her"; [two things that the nearest neighbors know nothing of], we believe the physician and the rest of the board who had a hand in examining him, should be brought up and tried for fit subjects for the same institution. If the boy is incorrigible and his mother cannot manage him, the place for him is in the reform school, not the asylum; or if he is the "desperate character" the witness makes him out to be, the penitentiary. But to talk about insanity. The main witness himself, only a short time ago was pleading insanity before a court of justice in this city, while on trial for assaulting a citizen with a dangerous weapon, and on this plea with the evidence offered he was let off with a small fine, and after the boy was pronounced insane, this gentleman was sent to escort him to Salem, which will net him something like \$55.00 to \$75.00, and will cost the county over \$100. It is simply a graft, a dirty steal from the tax payers and an outrage on humanity.

We are not waging war against the Chinese government, says the Oregonian, for we have no evidence of any hostile act or intention on the part of the Imperial government we recognize and with which we made our several treaties. We have fairly assumed that certain insurgents have either overthrown the Chinese government or have temporarily so paralyzed it, as the insurgents of the Paris Commune transiently did the government of France, that it cannot prevent or punish this anti foreign crusade. The movement of our troops for the rescue or defense of our citizens is not war upon China, any more than the pursuit and capture of a Chinese piratical junk would be. Under treaty of 1844 with China, "the laws of our Union follows its citizens, and its banner protects, even within the Chinese Empire." Our Government is only doing what it has a right to do under its treaties. Its only present purpose is to rescue and defend its own citizens, to demand a stable Chinese government, the integrity of the Empire and the preservation of existing rights of unrestricted trade over the Pacific with 400,000,000 of people now guaranteed by treaty.
