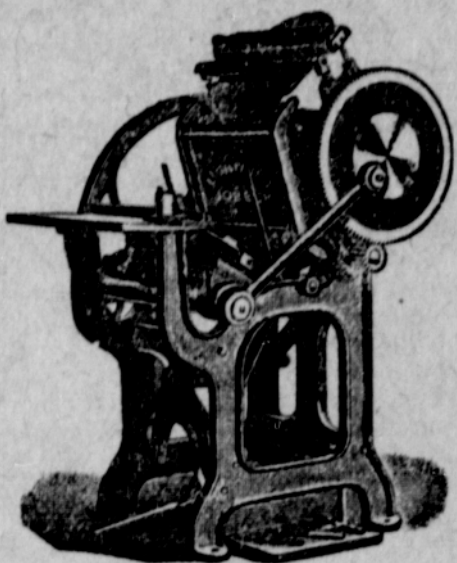

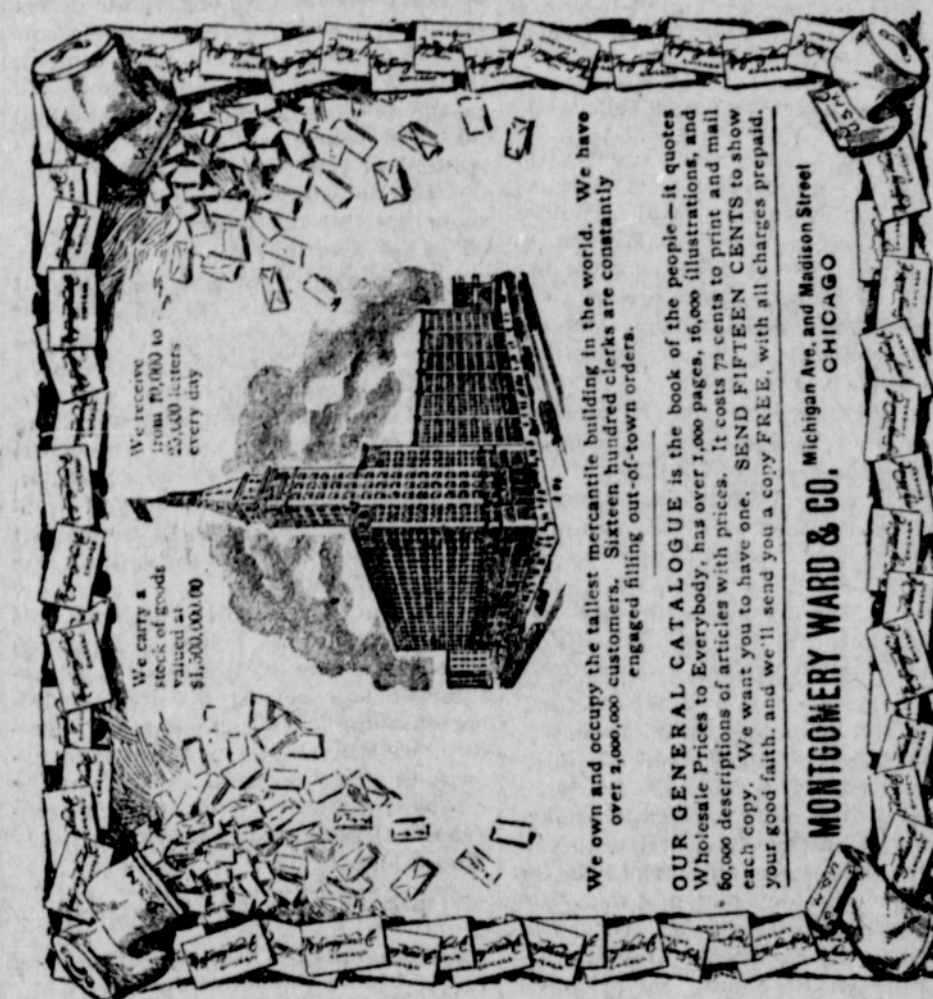

The Cigarette Smokers' Handicap.

Leaving aside all discussion of
the effect of cigarette smoking on
the health, it becomes every day,
plainer that the man who persists
in smoking the "paper pipes" is
severely handicapped in a business
way.

There is a widespread feeling
among business men—it makes no
difference for the purposes of this
argument whether it is well found
or not—that a man or a boy who
smokes cigarettes is not a desirable
person to "have around the shop"
or the office. Many of the largest
firms in the city make it a fixed
and immovable rule not to employ
cigarette smokers in any capacity.
Almost every day another business
house falls into line with this poli-
cy. Some firms have gone so far
as to forbid cigarette smoking among
their present employees under pen-
alty of dismissal. Other things
being equal, it is almost universally
true that of two men, one of whom
uses cigarettes while the other does
not, the latter will be preferred in
a business house or even in a facto-
ry.

The wise cigarette smoker will
face the facts as they exist and not
waste his time in trying to persuade
people that cigarettes are harmless.
He will make up his mind whether
his ruling ambition is to succeed in
business or to smoke cigarettes and
be governed accordingly. If he in-
sists on the solace of a puff from
his roll of paper and tobacco, he
may as well conclude that in the
end he will have more cigarettes
than money to burn. Business men
have apparently made up their
minds that they do not want cigar-
ette smokers in responsible posi-
tions, and business men are too
busy, as a rule, to listen to argu-
ments on the subject. It is a con-
dition and not a theory which con-
fronts the man who is wedded to
the cigarette.—Chicago Tribune.

Aluminum Clay.

Aluminum clay of very great
richness is reported to have been
discovered in Lincoln County, along
Snake River, for a distance of 10
miles from Thousand Springs to
Bliss. Some of this clay has been
assayed, and is said to contain
from 90 to 98 per cent silicate of
aluminum, and this means about
700 pounds pure aluminum to the
ton. This at 30 cents per pound
would mean \$210 to the ton, or bet-
ter than a mine in Klondike. There
is a world of clay banks from 25 to
100 feet high, so that no one can
have a monopoly on it. The only
monopoly is in the power, as the
metal requires 600 degrees Fahren-
heit to reduce it, and this means
1000 to 1400 electric horse-power.
Thousand Springs afford an ideal
power, or Salmon Falls, in Snake
River, could be used to advantage.

A Sensational Affair.

Sunday evening about 10 o'clock
as Mr. B. N. Butler and wife of
West Medford were retiring they
were surprised by a knock at the
door, and what was their surprise
upon opening the door to find an
infant laid upon their doorstep and
two persons fleeing down the street.
Mr. Butler upon recovering from
his surprise gave chase and succeed-
ed in following them as far as Ninth
and C. street where all trace of
them were lost. The baby is a
strong healthy girl about one month
old. Pinned to the bundle in which
it was wrapped was the following
note:

"This dear little child is left here
because its parents are unable to
take care of her. Their only prayer
is that you will be good to her and
that she may be brought up a
Christian. Her parents were mar-
ried on Aug. 23, 1899. They here-
by give up all claim to her.

it until morning when it was turned
over to Marshal Murray, who se-
cured Mrs. Fleming to attend it,
awaiting developments. So far
