STATE NEWS ITEMS.

A Scio farmer sold two hogs at Albany for \$44. They weighed 985 pounds.

A volunteer of the Spanish and Philippine Wars, suffering from rheumatism and diarrhea, is in Umatilla County's hospital. He expects to become an inmate of the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg.

The Baker City Democrat reports that P. A. Mann has sold his Front street property, a two-story brick in Baker known as Mann's Resort, to Henry Weinhard, of Portland, for a consideration of \$15,000.

The Southern Pacific freight and passenger business in Ashland for the month of July was \$9000 the largest since the railroad built its through line. There were 46 Eastern tickets sold during the month.

The Hood River Glacier is issuing a 40-page pamphlet of descriptive matter about the town of Hood River and Valley, its settlement industries, resources, etc. It is designed to answer questions of home seekers.

The Marshfield News of July 31 has this item: "A Coos River hunter was in town yesterday after lumber to build a smoke-house to dry venison. A party of four, while hunting on North Coos River, saw 65 deer and killed 19."

Medford's \$30,000 bond issue has been taken by the bank of that town, at 5 per cent. The money enables the Treasurer to take up \$20,000 of water bonds pay six months' accrued interest, and redeem \$9300 of outstanding 8 per cent warrants.

John D. Devine, the great cattle king of Harney County, says he is soon to go into sheep culture. This announcement astonished a Malheur paper, which says that it is not many years since it was sure death to use the ward sheep within 200 miles of Alvord Lake.

When Mr. Kretzer and his men went to work on the artesian well at The Dalles Wednesday morning they found the bottom had dropped out of it since the preceding evening. At that time the water rose to within 105 feet of the top, but now it is over 200 feet from the top.

Salem's canning and packing plant will not shut down this season. The abundance of vegetables, berries and fruits makes possible a continuous run. It has put up 100,000 cans of peas, 15,000 cans of preserved raspberries, is now handling blackberries, and will finish with Bartlett pears and tomatoes.

An estimate of the amount of tobacco chewed in the community, says the Sheridan Sun, can be obtained from the facts that a merchant in this city, who for the past six months has been saving the star tags off the 10-cent pieces of tobacco he sells, has 1050 tags, and this represents only about one-fifth of the amount he sold.

The Pendleton wool-scouring mill has scoured 948,741 pounds of wool this season thus far, and there is 750,500 pounds in sight to be scoured. The mill was run night and day for six weeks, then in the day time only for several weeks. Last week an attempt was again made to run day and night, but it had to be given up, owing to scarcity of men.

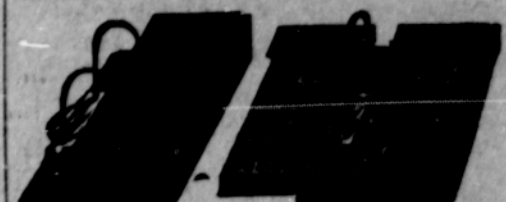
