Homestead Law Change.

The United States land offices
have just received a notice from the
department of the interior, which is
of the greatest importance to every
one who is in any way interested in
taking up the government lands.
Heretofore, according to law, a per-
son who had commuted, that is,
lived on a homestead claim for a
portion of the required time, and
had then bought the property clear,
had exhausted his title to, take up
another such claim. By the terms
of the new law commuters are now
entitled to another claim. Persons
who having taken a claim and for-
feited the same, or lost it from any
cause whatsoever, were also pre-
viously debarred from taking out a
second claim. The new act, how-
ever, provides that such may take
out a claim in the future as though
they had never made use of their
right.

The fund for work on the road
between Eugene and Blue River
has reached the respectable total of
\$5,241.50. Of this sum, Lane Coun-
ty's Commissioners subscribed
\$2500 and the Lucky Boy Mining
Company \$500.

Back to the Public Domain.

A decree restoring about 100 sec-
tions of land in Lake and Klamath
counties to the Government was
rendered by Judge Bellinger in the
United States Court at Portland,
Saturday in the suit of the United
States against the Oregon Central
Military Road Company. The de-
cree was granted upon the motion
of United States District Attorney
John H. Hall. The suit was brought
to recover the lands on the ground
that the defendant has not conform-
ed to the terms of the grant.

The decree states that the patents
issued by the United States pur-
porting to convey title to these
lands be and are hereby set aside,
cancelled and declared null and
void, and the title revert to the
United States, and all deeds of the
Oregon Central Military Road Com-
pany to the California & Oregon
Land Company, for these lands,
and decreed to be set aside and can-
celled.

This receipt is good for children
who are sick with, or have sym-
ptoms of cholera infantum or any
derangement of the digestive organs.
Take 1/2 pints each of milk and wa-
ter and set it to boil. Mix 1/2 table-
spoonful of corn starch and the
same of wheat flour. 1/2 table-spoonful
of white sugar, 1/2 teaspoonful of
cream tartar, put just enough milk
to this to dissolve it, then add the
beaten white of one egg. Now put
this mixture into the boiling milk
and water, stirring constantly until
it is of the consistency of rich
cream. Never cook this or any
article of food for children or sick
people in tin. If you have nothing
better, use a bowl set in a pan of
boiling water. Feed this just warm
a teaspoonful at a time if child is
very sick, increasing as it gets
better. Bathe the child's body
every night while very sick in a
warm mustard water adding a little
salt to the water. This receipt is
good for old people as well as
young.

Civil War says that he was well
acquainted with Silas L. Bryan, the
father of W. J. Bryan, in the town
of Salem, Ill., between the years of
1861 and 1865. He says S. L.
Bryan was a lawyer and for some
time Judge of the Circuit Court at
Salem. He was a bald-headed,
sharp-nosed old fellow, and in con-
siderable demand among the Dem-
ocrats as a public speaker. He was
fluent and dogmatic, and W. J.
Bryan inherited his "gift of gab"
from him. He was a bitter copper-

STATE NEWS ITEMS.

Eighty horses are in training at
the State Fair grounds, at Salem.

Newberg has just sold at public
auction a span of stray horses that
had been "on the town" for 10 days.
They brought \$176.

While hunting, Mrs. Mollie Bays
of Eagle Point, accidentally shot
Mrs. Robert Coker in the foot, last
week, with a rifle. She was "ready
for a bear" in case one was met.

The McMinnville Reporter says
of William B. Ungerman, a Span-
ish War veteran, who has been
granted a pension of \$6 per month:
"He has suffered untold misery
from the obstinate wound received
in the Philippines, and it is a plea-
sure to see him get some compensa-
tion, however slight."

About two months ago three of
John Koberg's fine Jersey calves,
6 months old, were caught on the
railroad track and each had a leg
broken by a passenger train, says
the Hood River Glacier. The bones
of their legs were dangling. Mr.
Koberg immediately went to work
to set the fractures, and, with the
assistance of his wife, succeeded on
all three. After three or four weeks
the bandages were removed, and
now the calves seem to be all right.

Klamath County has 4000 people
and an assessed valuation of \$1,600,-
000, which leads the Klamath Falls

Eastern people to suppose that be-
