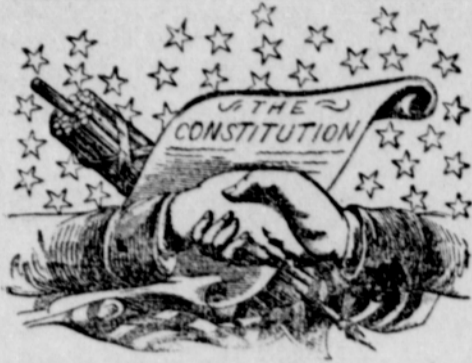

Even the infant industries in Kansas are prospering. Three sets of triplets were born in one Kansas town the other day.

The Chinese think they can scare the powers off by overflowing the country in front of the advancing column. They evidently never heard of Funston.

W. S. Stratton, who recently sold his Independence mine at Cripple Creek for \$10,000,000, gave \$25,000 to the Democratic campaign fund in 1896, and was one of Bryan's most enthusiastic supporters. This year he says he will give more than \$25,000 to the Republican campaign fund, and will support McKinley.

The first important office to which Adlai Stevenson was nominated was that of Presidential Elector in Illinois in 1864, on the McClellan and Pendleton ticket, on the platform declaring the war a failure and demanding its immediate cessation and the withdrawal of Union troops from the field. He was elected to Congress as a Greenbacker in 1874; was defeated for re-election in 1876; was again elected to Congress as a Greenbacker in 1878, and was beaten for re-election in 1880 and 1882.

The new boss in Kansas politics is Mrs. Annie L. Diggs. She is a Populist; she is State Librarian, and she it was who "held up" the fusion convention the other day and made it put a Populist candidate on the ticket for Associate Justice. And this, notwithstand-

ing there is no woman suffrage in Kansas. The Paoli Spirit records the business in this style:

There was a three-ring political managerie and circus at Fort Scott last Tuesday and Wednesday with one Annie Diggs, in swallow-fork attire, as ringmaster. She was "it," and a holy show of herself and the whole thing she made. Democrats who hadn't carried a bucket of water or an armful of wood for their wives at home in years gone, carries her trail, petticoat and all, while the Populists swept and carpeted the path in front of her and the Silver Republicans bore her fan and smelling salts.

The killing of a number of American soldiers by Russian shells at Yang Tsun is one of the sad but not uncommon incidents of war. In the Italian campaign of 1796 General La Harpe, one of Bonaparte's best division commanders, was killed by the fire of his own men. General "Stonewall" Jackson was mortally wounded by the fire of his own men at Chancellorsville, and General Longstreet was severely wounded by the fire of his own men at the second day of the battle of the Wilderness. In the night march that preceded the fight at Big Bethel, Va., June 17, 1861, two New York Regiments of Union Volunteers fired into each other at a severe cost in killed and wounded.

Those democratic papers that are trying to guy Teddy Roosevelt on his military record are painfully silent about the record of William J. Bryan. Both McKinley and Roosevelt have marched through the enemy's lines and faced the enemy's bullets. Bryan resigned his commission, never having made a march or fired a shot, and his resignation was handed in just before his regiment was ordered to the front.

The democratic press is telling the people that the McKinley prosperity is only skin deep. Perhaps they are right, but there is no question about the Cleveland adversity having reached to the joints and marrow of the body politic. Skin deep republican prosperity is a thousand-fold better than bone deep democratic hard times.

The immigration to the United States is on the increase. For the fiscal year ending June 30 the total number who landed at the port of New York was 341,711, or an increase of 100,000 over the preceding year. The United States continues to be everybody's country.

Governor Roosevelt wishes to have it understood that his name should be pronounced in the Dutch fashion, Ro-se-velt, and not Roosevelt, or Roos-felt, as it is often heard. In Dutch the doubling of "o" indicates merely a protraction of its sound.

Mr. Bryan's recent silence is accounted for by the fact that he was spending a good deal of time trying to decide whether to commence his speeches with "My comrades of the tented field" or "My fellow-farmers."—Register.

Adlai Stevenson says that political parties are "things of the hour." A man who has run on both a Cleveland and a Bryan platform might be expected to take an elastic view of politics.

Collis P. Huntington, veteran railway magnate and millionaire, died suddenly Monday evening at his summer home, "Camp Pine Knot," in the Adirondack mountains. He was seized with a sudden illness and though everything possible was done to relieve him, he lived only a few minutes. The nature of his illness was not known at the time the report was sent in, but was thought to be heart trouble.
