GOOD FOR SORE EYES.—Last Monday the writer and another gentleman visited the Lawrence mine on Galls creek and were shown through the tunnel by H. B. Nye and his partner Mr. Wortman. The tunnel at that time was 135 feet long. Eighty feet from the entrance these gentlemen are sinking a shaft which was twelve feet deep. At the end of the tunnel they are digging upward in order to have an air shaft from the surface. There is a vein of quartz about twelve or thirteen inches in width at this point that is beautiful to look at, being studded with the yellow metal. They had just finished milling three tons of waste ore at the Rogue River Mill on Saturday and thought it would probably go about twenty dollars to the ton, but to their surprise when the cleanup was made they found it had gone considerably over \$80 to the ton. Mr. Nye losing a hat on the value of the cleanup. A visit to a few more mines like this would give most any one the mining fever.
