## STATE NEWS ITEMS.

Fire has destroyed 200 acres of timber 11 miles north of Klamath Falls.

At Eugene, the flouring mill has bought 9000 bushels of wheat, paying 50 cents.

At an auction sale in Fossil, Saturday, work horses brought from \$50 to \$85 per head, spot cash.

Douglas County's delinquent taxes amount to \$24,181, and 3 per cent penalty is now added, making the tax burden unusually heavy.

The Lakeview Rustler has this about the rebuilding of its town: "Nine brick buildings are being constructed, and with the four damaged bricks repaired and the concrete, Lakeview is sure of 14 fireproof buildings, besides those covered with iron plate. We predict that by the Fall of 1901 Lakeview will almost be rebuilt."

Says the Albany Herald; A man coming up from Portland a few days ago, said he was looking for a steady job. He had been working in Eastern Oregon where he said, the work wasn't steady enough, so he threw up a job he had and started for the valley. He began work at 4 o'clock in the morning, stopped a few minutes for breakfast, worked until noon, stopped, a short time for dinner, worked until 6 o'clock, stopped for supper and then worked until 9:30, when they quit work entirely—until 4 o'clock next morning. What he wanted was a place where there was work all the time.
