

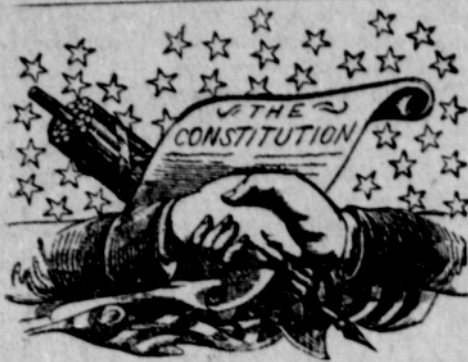

Goebelism is on the wane in Kentucky. Last November Campbell County gave Goebel 61 majority for Governor. On August 6, at a special election, it gave the Republican candidate for State Senator a majority of 170. The Blue Grass State is waking up to the deep-laid Democratic plot to rob it of the ballot.

"You can't secure title to a people by force or purchase," says Statesman Bryan. No, but you can secure title to the country they live in, and if they don't like it they can sell out and leave; just as the men of the Hudson's Bay Company skurried out of Oregon after the treaty of 1847 secured the country to the United States.—Ex.

You can't fool these old boys out in Oregon. The other day a fellow strayed into this city from Eastern Oregon, where he is engaged exten-

sively in sheep raising. He became engaged in a political discussion while in company with several politicians, and here is the argument he put up: "I bought 2000 Cleveland sheep at \$2.25 a head and sold them as McKinley sheep at \$4.35 and cleaned up \$4200. Now if you can talk me into voting for Bryan and out of that \$4200 you are a dandy."—O. C. Enterprise.

After all, China isn't formidable. It was teared modern weapons might make her so. But a force of 15,000 American, European and Japanese troops has gone through a difficult country a distance of 100 miles and taken the capital of an "empire" of 300,000,000. Another proof that it is not the number of men, but the quality of men. A single American or European army corps could go anywhere in China. It would be easy to get "consent of the governed" in a country like that. It will be had in the Philippines as soon as the dream of a Bryan-Aguinaldo protectorate shall be over.—Oregonian.

Since June 30, 1899, there has been a considerable increase of the number of National banks, under the act of March 14, 1900. In June 1899, there were 3583 National banks, with \$604,865,327 of capital and \$228,870,320 of notes in circulation. In June last the number of such banks was 3858, with capital of \$631,108,095 and circulation of \$294,938,830. Since June 11 last there have been 111 National banks organized, 18 of which are private or state banks which have taken National charters. Many of the new banks have the minimum capital of \$25,000. It would take 400 such banks to make a total capitalization of \$10,000,000.

It is reported that a resolution will probably be passed at the coming Grand Army encampment in Chicago to change the date of Memorial day from May 30 to the last Sunday in May. This would be an excellent reform, for the obvious reason that the day is, in its essential motive and ceremony, a sacred one, but it has come to be given over, outside the Grand Army, to sports and amusements, so that its significance has been greatly impaired in the popular mind. The celebration of Memorial day on Sunday is not out of harmony with the spirit of the day of rest; the marching and the flowers are nothing more than would be deemed fitting and appropriate to a military funeral, and care could be taken not to have the exercises interfere with any of the services of the churches.

Forty-seven years ago, at a Democratic state convention, held at Montpelier, Vt., the Democrats of Vermont adopted the following resolution on the subject of expansion, which was introduced by the brilliant John Godfrey Saxe, wit and poet, who was then the editor of the Burlington Weekly Sentinel:

Resolved, That in opposing the narrow and timid policy which, had it prevailed, would have limited the United States of America to the territory of Massachusetts, Connecticut and the "Providence Plantations," the Democratic party has wisely favored the enlargement of the domain of freedom; and that we are in favor of the acquisition of any territory on this continent or the islands adjacent thereto, whenever it can be done consistently with the rights of other nations and the honor of our own.
