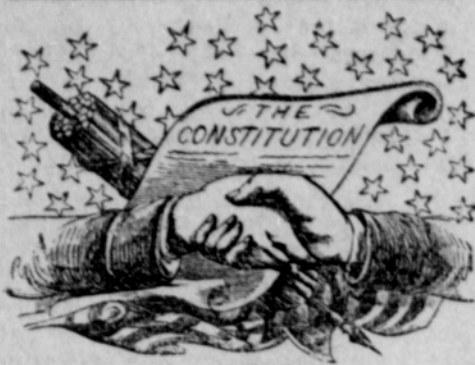

In principle and in fact there is
no difference between coercion in
the Philippines now and coercion
of the South from 1861 to 1865. In
one case as in the other, the enforce-
ment of National sovereignty
against a people disputing it was
and is the only issue. Not consent
of the governed, but National au-
thority, was and is the question.
The way to get consent of the gov-
erned is through use of force. After
the consent is obtained through
force it is held through knowledge
that force will be used again, if au-
thority should be disputed. This
is the basis on which all men sub-
mit to government. No man likes
the government to which he is sub-
ject, but he submits because he has
no choice. Not a man in the
United States but would change its
government very materially, if he
could.

There are now 12 United States
Senators who have been Governors
of their respective states. They are
Davis and Nelson, of Minnesota;
Proctor, of Vermont; Berry, of Ar-
kansas; Hawley, of Connecticut;
Cullom, of Illinois; Bate, of Ten-
nessee; Perkins, of California;
Shoup, of Idaho; Tillman, of South
Carolina; Foraker, of Ohio, and
Culberson, of Texas. Of these
eight are Republicans and four
Democrats.

It is related of the late C. P.
Huntington that a young man once
called on him to sell some much-
needed rails at \$75 a ton. Mr.
Huntington said he had rails him-
self, amused the caller by a half-
hour's chat and got him to sell at
\$66 a ton, with a six months' note
for pay. Then before the man left
Mr. Huntington discounted the
note for 6 per cent and paid the
cash.

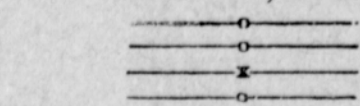
