Senator Clarke is going to spend \$500,000 to elect Bryan. The Senator's former investment of this kind was such a glittering success that, of course, he is sure he can do it.

An uproar has been raised in Mexico over the theft of funds which had been subscribed to purchase a warship for Spain. It is quite probable that the thieves believed it would be criminal to present the Spanish with another toy such as had proved so dangerous to themselves.

The late John J. Ingalls had

much good sense, which shone brilliantly at times, in spite of occasional obscurations. He had a pessimist's distrust that is, a wise man's distrust—of reformers who expect to work regeneration of society through legislation. He refused to believe that ignoble and vicious individuals can be so manipulated that they will behave nobly and virtuously. He held that social reform, if it is to be lasting, must begin with the individual, that the reformer must work through the "inner forms" of society upon its "outer forms," as Carlyle puts it. "What is needed," Ingalls once wrote, "is some legislation that will give brains to the brainless, thrift to the thriftless, industry to the irresolute and discernment to the fool. Till this panacea is discovered the patient must minister to himself." And his own mildewed career affords no small confirmation of his dismal philosophy.—Oregonian.

A gentlemen from Eastern Oregon who was down here a few days ago, says that part of the state is strong for McKinley. The great difference in the price of wool between the Cleveland and McKinley administrations has opened the eyes of the sheep raisers, and he says that many old Missourians, who have never voted anything but the democratic ticket in their whole lives, will cast their first republican vote for McKinley. They have no trouble in determining the paramount issue.—Graphic Newberg.

Bryan assumes that the Filipinos under the sovereignty of the United States, will not have liberty. This slander upon the United States is approved by his party. But what would Bryan do? He says he would "give the Filipinos a stable government." But by what right would he establish a government for them? His principles require that the Filipinos be abandoned wholly to themselves, without hindrance or dictation, and that no one assume to "set up" any kind of "government" for them.

Abraham Lincoln, also, says the Nebraska State Journal, was called Imperator, but that did not cause him to swerve from his duty. He said, with perfect good nature, after one of these periodical attacks of Democratic abuse: "There is no fear of the people losing their liberties. We all know this to be the cry of demagogues, and none but the ignorant will listen to them." This is recommended to the consideration of the persons who are misquoting Lincoln so vigorously at this time.

Thus far the Bryanites have had a free field for their "campaign" throughout the country. Is any effort to be made for the Administration and the Republican party? It is but two months till the election, and scarcely a word has been heard from the Republican side. Perhaps no effort is deemed necessary. And yet a mistake might be made there.—Oregonian.
