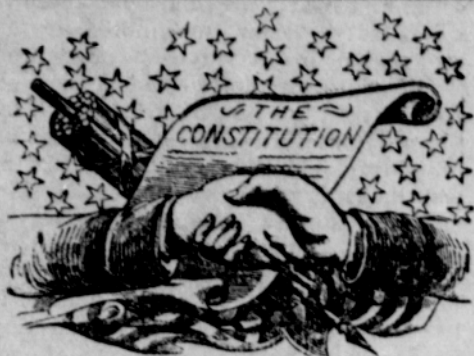

FEEDING ON CALAMITY.

Democrats are as eager as ever to feed on calamity. They rejoice over the coal strike, thinking it will help them in their campaign; they hail with joy a victory by the insurgents in some slight skirmish in Luzon; if our exports should fall off they would howl with delight and exclaim, "Is this your prosperity?" if a failure is recorded, they cannot conceal their gratification, for it enables them to ask, "Where are your good times?" The people of this country are not quite ready to turn over affairs to a party that is always looking for evil times and thrives on distress.—Ex.

Mr. Bryan did not close his predicting department when he received the election returns of 1896. After his defeat he issued an address in which he said: "Before the year 1900 arrives the evil effects of a gold standard will be even more evident than they now are, and the people then ready to demand an American financial policy for the American people, will join with us in the immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the present ratio of 16 to 1." Has anybody noticed a great rush at the realization entrance of this prediction?

During the state campaign in Kentucky two years ago Henry Watterson paid his compliments to the "peerless" leader as follows: "Mr. William J. Bryan has come to Kentucky and Kentuckians have taken his measure. He is a boy orator. He is a dishonest dodger. He is a daring adventurer. He is

a political faker. He is not of the material of which the people of the United States have ever made a president, nor has he even material of which any party has ever before made a candidate." Such was the judgment two years ago. Since then Bryan has not changed, but now Mr. Watterson, who continues to be in favor of the gold standard, and who is a strong "imperialist," is supporting the artful dodger and political faker.

On September 1, 1900, the per capita of money in circulation in the United States was \$26.85 or the largest in the history of the country. Does this look like 16 to 1 is a necessity or even any part of a political issue. But it is the real issue so far as the democratic party is concerned and its dim, flickering light cannot be hidden under the imperialistic bushel.

Governor Roosevelt is stirring up old Montana as she has never been stirred before. He is hurling some hot shot into the enemies' camp until they feel very much like the other fellows did at San Juan hill.

The religious weeklies are all practically supporting McKinley. This is a heavy blow to Bryan, who is a very "religious" man, an active church member, and does not even smoke.

The bugaboo of imperialism is not as much the paramount issue as the question to whom that \$50,000 will be paid for the next four years.

Bryan spoke under a three-ringed circus tent at Kansas City on the night of the 17th. He must have felt perfectly at home.

TO THE PEOPLE OF JACKSON COUNTY.

It has been the custom and the requirement of the law for the Sheriff of the County to place notices of sale for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer, but owing to the passage of a law at the last session of the legislature repealing this requirement of the law there will be no levy made on the property of taxpayers by placing notices of sale for taxes on the property. Hereafter there will be a certificate of levy filed with the County Clerk in accordance with the requirement of the law, and the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers; beyond that there will be no further notice given to the delinquent tax payers. If the taxpayers wish to avoid further expense they should call and settle at once.
