The Merchant's Rostrum.

The columns of the newspaper is the merchant's rostrum. It is his pulpit. It is his stump. From that he addresses the public at large. Advertising is the channel through which the merchant speaks to the people he desires to address. The supreme object of newspaper advertising is to get the people into the store. The Butte Miner announces in large black type that it is "the only paper circulated in this community that is supporting the democratic ticket." This is cheerful news for Bryan.

The vice-president of the United States should be a man who is capable of being president if the succession should devolve upon him. Theodore Roosevelt is pre-eminently one of the foremost among the able men of the nation. He has not acquired his eminence by chance or stratagem but by solid ability and merit. He is one of the most popular men and his popularity is based upon his official record. His name has become a synonym for strength and integrity to an extent which has been accorded to few men in the national history. The presidential ticket is ordinarily a one man affair, with the vice president nominee put in merely to fill space, but the ticket of McKinley and Roosevelt is a notable exception to this rule and the latter holds his place in the public interest equally with the former.—Courier.

COLVIG DECLARES FOR McKINLEY.

William M. Colvig, of Jacksonville, one of the leading lawyers of Oregon, and a democratic warhorse of the old school, has come out against Bryan. Four years ago Mr. Colvig loyally supported Bryan, and was known as one of the best campaigners the democracy had in Oregon. But he can't stand the Bryanite doctrine of hauling

down the flag, and has declared for McKinley and Roosevelt. In a letter to George A. Steel, chairman of the Republican State Committee offering his services for the campaign, Mr. Colvig says:

"There are a goodly number of democrats in this (Jackson) county, who, for the sake of party, might be led considerably out of the way on purely economic questions relating to governmental affairs, but when they are required, as now, by their leaders to take a position that makes them feel like American cowards, they will not go. Some of us place our love of country, its flag, its institutions, and its destiny far above party loyalty."

Mr. Colvig will deliver a 30- or 40-minute speech at some meeting to be arranged by the Republican State Committee, in Portland, sometime this month.—Oregonian.
