At one of the meetings during
the opening of the republican cam-
paign in Ohio, Senator Hanna was
called upon for a speech after Sen-
ator Depew had concluded. The
Ohio Senator remarked that it was
not fair to expect a speech from
him after the able address of his
predecessor, so instead of making a
speech he would tell a story, illus-

trative of the workingman's dinner
pail. A farmer, he said, bought a
cow and calf from a neighbor. He

This is the first time in all the
long and eventful history of this
country that it has been found nec-
essary to officially "call down" a
candidate for President of the
United States for either deliberate
or reckless falsification, as acting
secretary of war Meiklejohn has
deemed it incumbent upon himself
to do, in the case of Mr. Bryan,
who has made and persistently re-
peated the statement that the treaty
of the United States with the Sult-
an of Sulu recognizes slavery. Mr.
Meiklejohn shows by the record
that instead of recognizing slavery
the treaty distinctly prohibits it,
and it was so understood at the
time it was made. Is this not a
spectacle to bring the blush to the
cheeks of the American people?
Such falsification might be excused
in a jack-leg lawyer; but it cannot
be lightly passed by in a candidate
for the highest office in the gift of
the people of the greatest nation on
earth, who employs it for the pur-
pose of trying to influence a few
votes in his favor on account of
the prejudice sought to be appeal-
ed to.
