Registration everywhere is heav-

sign of calamity and ruin. Today
he points to the fact that we are a

The New York Herald estimates
that McKinley will receive 281
electoral votes. This estimate is
made after a careful canvass of the
doubtful states.

New York's population is double

York is 656,154. That of Chicago
is 401,826.

The circuit court of appeals has
decided that granite of a merchant-
able quality makes land mineral
in character, and so excepted from
a railroad grant, and that it may
be located and held as a mining
claim. In the case decided the
Northern Pacific Railroad company
sought to oust from one of its sec-
tions a claimant who had located
the granite formation as a mining
claim, but the mineral claimant
won. According to the court's de-
cision a deposit of fossils on public
land might be acquired under the
mining laws.—California Miner.
