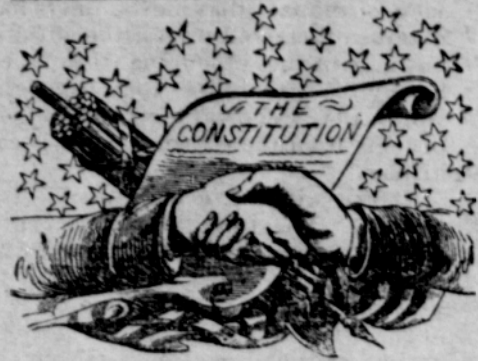

UGHT TO REFUSE.

We suggest to Mr. Bryan to consider privately and specially this part of his Madison Square Garden discussion of money:

"We are not opposed to that wealth which comes as the reward of honest toil, and is enjoyed by those who give to society something in return for that which society bestows upon them."

It will trouble Mr. Bryan to show anything that he has "given to society" during his last four prosperous years, except ill-natured prophecies that turned out wrong. To live up to his sentiments on wealth he must give back his money.—New York Sun.

The growth of the postal money-order business during the past year has been phenomenal. The people of the United States may not have money to burn, but clearly they have it to spend and to send. The figures show an increase of \$30,500,000 over the previous year. Within the same period the international money order business nearly doubled, rising from \$6,000,000 to \$11,000,000. The total annual issue of postoffice money orders is now \$256,000,000. It is but just to say that the increased popularity of the money order has probably resulted as much from improved methods of handling the business as from the general prosperity of the country. Orders are now cashed at large postoffices even when mistakes have obviously been made in the name of the paying office. Payees are notified, too, when an advice has remained two weeks in an office without present

tion of its corresponding order. The introduction of carbon sheets, so that the letter of advice is a duplicate of the order, has greatly reduced errors. All of which shows that there are progressive business men at the head of the postal department whom it will be well to keep there.

Four years ago Bryan made a grand stand play by refusing to eat a five dollar dinner in New York and ostentatiously attended a dollar a plate supper in honor of Jefferson. During his last visit to New York he attended a Tammany banquet where the dinner was served by the Hoffman Cafe at \$12 a plate, exclusive of wines, which, having to be kept on Tammany ice, ran the cost up much higher. Mr. Bryan could not have emphasized the demagoguery of his widely advertised dollar supper more nor paid a higher tribute to McKinley prosperity than thus admitting that the times are good enough to warrant him in increasing the price of a banquet plate eleven hundred per cent.

Hon. T. H. Tongue and C. E. S. Wood of Portland had a joint discussion on the issues of the campaign, at Grants Pass, Thursday afternoon and evening. Mr. Tongue spoke first in the afternoon and Mr. Wood followed in a half-hour reply; in the evening Mr. Wood opened the discussion and Mr. Tongue was allowed time in which to reply. The result of the discussion was a large number of votes made for McKenley and Roosevelt.

There are now 150,000 children in the primary schools of Cuba, as against 30,000 under Spanish rule. This may well be viewed with alarm, as a forecast of what is likely to happen to the wretched Filipinos under the benighted and despotic rule of the United States. Let the antis redouble their efforts in behalf of this liberty-menaced people.

The receipts of the postoffices of the three leading towns of the valley have been growing steadily, as will be noticed by the following statistics: Ashland, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895, \$3809; 1899, \$4984; 1900, \$5595. Grants Pass, 1896, \$4221; 1899, \$4945; 1900, \$5331. Medford, 1896, \$3214; 1899, \$3497; 1900, \$3907.

A contemporary in a near-by town apologizes for a typographical error whereby the word "marrying" was made to appear in the paper as "worrying." The apology was unnecessary. The printer setting the word up probably being a married man, the confusion of ideas was only natural.

On Friday last Lord Roberts formally declared the Transvaal annexed to the British empire, a great demonstration at Pretoria accompanying the announcement. The Boers celebrated the event, too—by a raid into Natal.—San Francisco Bulletin.

European dealers are said to have begun marking many articles they have for sale, "Made in America." There are many fortunes in European titled families that might be marked that way, too, without straining the facts.

The board of construction is now considering a program to have 40 new warships constructed for this government. It only needs the approval of the president, which will be given, to be put into force.

It is said that the Bryan meeting in New York was such a hot one that it melted the ice and watered the stock of the ice trust, but this probably a mistake. Mr. Croker has not been heard to complain.
