The following item appeared in a Willamette valley exchange of recent date:

Three carloads of potatoes were shipped to Southern Oregon by an Aurora firm Wednesday.

At the present time and for the past four years since the News was first established in this city, there has been not less than fifty carloads of potatoes shipped into our town, to say nothing of what has been shipped into other towns of the valley. Now, if potatoes can be shipped into the country and sold at a profit, after having paid the railroad for freighting them in, why cannot our farmers here raise potatoes and put them on the market in sufficient quantities to supply the home trade? Our farmers say there is no money in raising wheat at present prices. Potatoes bring, on an average, one cent per pound, and the writer knows a farmer personally who bought thirty acres of land near Salem and paid for it the first year by raising potatoes on it. Now, if the Willamette farmers can make money raising "spuds" for 50 cents per hundred, what's the matter with the Rogue River farmer who cannot make money on wheat but would raise potatoes? Car after car is shipped in and sold for \$1 to \$1.25 per hundred, and the Rogue River valley land will raise potatoes of just as good quality and larger crops to the acre.
