The "GIMLET" continues to bore. And from the howl of some of the sore heads, the hole is of no small dimensions.

The Bryan celebration was held in New York before election day. The McKinley Celebration will be held in a few days.

In the First Judicial district four years ago, Bryan got the following majorities: Jackson, 1000; Josephine, 300; Klamath, 100; Lake, 50. This year they gave majorities for McKinley and prosperity.

There will be a convention of county officials—judges, assessors and commissioners—in Portland, Nov. 20th. The object is to agree upon uniform methods of assessment, collection of taxes and various other matters of public importance.

The great political battle has been fought, and the victory won. Now let's lay aside party lines, and settle down to business, and work for the upbuilding of Gold Hill and Jackson county. It can be done, if all will work together and put their shoulder to the wheel.

We wish to call the attention of our readers to the new ads in this issue of the News, and recommend that you patronize only those who are represented in our columns, as the paper depends entirely upon its patrons for support, and the towns growth depends to a certain extent upon the paper. In other words, to be plain, you boost the merchants, who boost the paper, that boosts the town.

A presidential candidate is the candidate of a party. After he is elected and inaugurated, he is president, not of any party, but of the nation. As such he should be accorded the support of every citizen, regardless of party, in his efforts to serve the nation. The bitterness of a partisan campaign should not follow him through his term of office and his every act criticised and warped to the worst possible construction by the prejudice of his political opponents. This is a condition and sentiment which is utterly wrong. It is only fair to wait at least until there is some

tangible and sensible reason for criticism and opposition and until that time to give loyal and cordial support to the president of our great nation.

Imagine a farmer trying to raise a crop by sitting on the fence, as he looks over his farm, wishing that a nice crop of wheat or corn would spring up on it. Ridiculous, isn't it? The laboring men wants good wages maintained. They would rather see three jobs for one man than one job for the lowest bidder amongst a crowd seeking employment at any price. Their votes demonstrated that fact last Tuesday.

Nevada, hopelessly populist and free silver, is the only state in the Union that has lost in population during the last ten years. In 1890 it had 45,761 inhabitants. Now it has only 42,334, a loss of 8 per cent in the ten years.

In 1896 Bryan carried Gold Hill precinct by a majority of 192 votes. Last Tuesday he carried the precinct by 23, a difference of 169. It's surprising how that "GIMLET" bores.

Coxey's army was fully employed under McKinleys administration—that is, such portion of it as was willing to work, the rest of it did nothing but yell for Bryan.

The wisdom of the people has upheld our national honor by defeating Bryan and all Bryanism means and re-electing Wm. McKinley president.
