OREGON NOTES

Eagle Point organized a football team last week.

Less than \$4000 remains unpaid of the Lane county 1899 tax roll.

The annual meeting of the state board of agriculture will be held at Salem December 11.

Lakeview will have an express office as soon as arrangements are completed with Wells-Fargo.

E. J. Farlow and F. M. Drake, while hunting last Sunday, shot a pure white quail, says the Ashland Record.

A law is proposed at Salem for keeping record of births, deaths and cases of infectious and contagious diseases.

Miss Lulu Jones, the victim of the murderous assault at Jefferson, a short time ago, is out of danger and is nearing recovery.

At Dalles is an apple tree laden with blossoms, and fully developed fruit, says the Observer. The tree bore a large crop this season, and is again in full bloom.

The Port Orford Tribune says that one of ex-Sheriff Turner's fine animals at Gold Beach fell into an old well 40 feet deep, and was lifted out with a block and tackle practically uninjured.

Workmen are now engaged in digging and building a cinder pit for the coal burning engines in the Ashland yards. The size of the pit is to be 20x24 feet. It will be timbered and lined with brick.

Telegrams received in Ashland this week say that both Walter Drennan the injured engineer, and Ed Riddle the fireman, continue to improve and are much better. Riddle underwent an operation on his foot and stood the shock very well.

They can't run a bluff on John Hays, says the Grants Valley Journal. A man offered to bet him his socks that McKinley would be elected. He immediately called the bluff, and the two left their socks with a stakeholder.

Three native sons of Oregon have been elevated to prominent judicial positions in Washington. They are Wallace Mount, just elected to the supreme bench; S. J. Chadwick son of ex-governor Chadwick, who has defeated the notorious McDonald for the superior judgeship of Whitman county, and George W.

Belt, elected as superior judge of Spokane county.

The home of William Gray in the western part of Ashland, together with its entire contents, was totally destroyed by fire Sunday at 5 o'clock a. m. The family were left entirely destitute, escaping with their nightclothes only. The loss on house and contents is \$1200.

All Huntington turned out Friday, says the Baker City Democrat to see J. O. Moudy and J. C. Meyers pay election penalties. They gave wheelbarrow rides to J. F. Goodman and Pete Johnson, who bet on McKinley. The route was lined with interested spectators.
