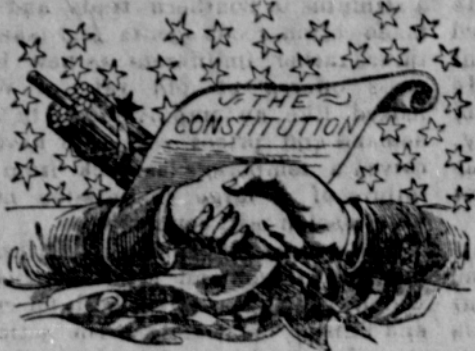

A couple of months ago, says the Battle Lake Growler, an old man came into this office and stopped his paper. We have frequently met him on the streets since that time and it is very amusing to note the look of surprise on the old fellows face that we are still in existence regardless of the fact that he had "stopped his paper." Some day, and it will not be very long either, that poor old fellow will turn up his toes. Neighbors and friends will follow his lifeless clay out to the cemetery and lay him to rest among the flowers. An obituary will appear in these columns, telling what a kind father, good neighbor and benevolent citizen he was—which the recording angel will kindly overlook for charity's sake—and in a short time thereafter he will be forgotten. As he lies out there in the cold graveyard wrapped in the silent slumber of death, he will never know that the last kind words spoken of him were those of the editor of the paper which he "stopped."

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs, William A. Jones, tells the government in his annual report that "large money payments to the Indians are demoralizing in the extreme," adding: "They degrade the Indians and corrupt the whites, induce pauperism, scandal and crime, and nullify all the good effects of labor." The truth of this statement cannot be doubted; the reasons that support it are obvious. When it is remembered in this connection that there stands to the credit of the Indian tribes in the national treasury \$33,815,955, it may readily be conceded that the ultimate disposal of these moneys is a serious congressional consideration.

In the death of Marcus Daly all political differences are forgotten, and Montana mourns him as an enterprising, worthy citizen whose

energies will long leave the impress of their power upon the industries of the state. If W. A. Clark would now pass on, Montana politics might cease to be a synonym of boodle and corruption. The discovery would, moreover, be made that he, too, had been a powerful factor in the development of the natural resources of the state. This is as it should be. He is a poltroon indeed who would pursue, or seek to pursue, an enemy beyond the grave.

Somebody has explained the significance of the editorial "we." It may have a variety of meanings. For example: When you read that "we" expect our wife home today, "we" refers to the editor; "we are a little late with our work" refers to the whole office force, even the devil and the towel; in "we are having a boom" the town is meant; "we received over 7000 emigrants this year" embraces the nation; but "we have hog cholera in our midst" means that the man who takes the paper and does not pay for it is very ill. As against the belief that American youth are averse to naval service, the report of Admiral Crowninshield shows that over 68 per cent of the men in the navy are native born, while 92 per cent of the landsmen now under training are Americans. This is gratifying since according to popular opinion, properly trained Americans are the best fighters in the world.

The missionaries who are so anxious to return to China and convert the "heathen" there might find a more fertile field of labor if they would turn their attention in the direction of Limon, Colorado, where a negro boy was recently burned at the stake.

A movement has been started in the east to make the second inaugural of McKinley the grandest display of the kind ever seen; and the occasion merits it, for the election came nearer being unanimous than any we are ever likely to see again.
