Death of C. P. Parker.

Mrs. A. E. Kellogg received, Wednesday, from Lexington, Ore., the sad intelligence of the death of her father, C. P. Parker, formerly of this place. He was engaged in snaking timbers down the mountain side near his home with a team when he lost control of the team and jumped to clear himself, slipped and fell on a double bitted ax sticking in the timber, causing a wound. He only lived a few minutes.

His wife and eight children survive him, all being at home except Mrs. R. A. Carter of Phoenix, and Mrs. A. E. Kellogg of this place.
