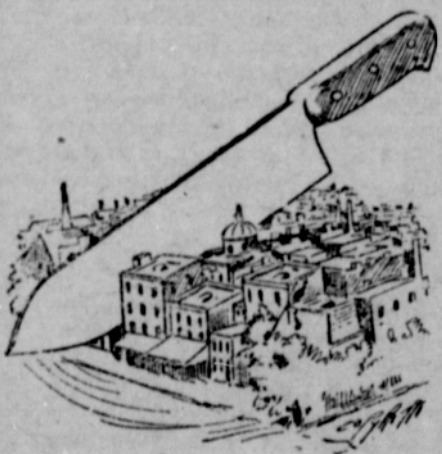

EXPLOSION AT ASHLAND MINE

Three Miners Injured Wednesday by the Explosion of a Box of XXX Giant Caps.

An accident, quite serious in its results to three miners, took place at the 500 foot level of the Ashland mine, yesterday morning, at 4:30 o'clock. Three miners, John Matson, W. K. Smith and H. G. Fairclo, were arranging a fuse with giant caps to touch off a blast. Matson, who was doing the crimping, had a box of 50 of the giant caps, was stooping down and had placed the caps on the ground beneath him while he was doing the work. The men were at the station at the 500 foot level, arranging for their shot before quitting work on the night shift. They had just finished crimping the caps on the fuse when the box of XXX giant caps went off with a loud explosion. Matson had his face, breast and legs badly perforated with the copper and brass from the caps, and his right eye injured to an extent that it is thought he will lose its sight. W. K. Smith's face, legs and breast were perforated by the dying copper, while H. G. Fairclo sustained light injuries, only a few pieces of copper penetrating his clothing.

Just how the explosion occurred is not known by the men; but it is thought that a spark from the candles the miners were carrying for light must have fallen on the caps and caused them to go off as they did, scattering things in all directions. Fortunately the powder was about 100 feet away from the point where the men were working with the caps, or the results would have been sadly different. As it proved it is marvelous that the three men escaped with as light injuries as they did, considering the explosive power of the XXX giant caps.

This is the first accident that has taken place in the Ashland mine since gold bearing rock has been blasted from it.

Matson was sent to Portland to have his injuries attended to on last night's north bound overland passenger train.

Found Dead in a Barn.

Monday evening, a man applied to Mr. Pierce, who lives on the Severson place east of town, asking permission to sleep in his barn. The request was granted and the man, a stranger, went to the barn to sleep. During the next day, Tuesday, Mr. Pierce had no occasion to visit the barn, but on Wednesday morning he found the dead body in a shed which adjoins the barn. He came to town immediately and notified Coroner T. A. Hood, who went out Wednesday

afternoon to hold the inquest.—Grants Pass Courier.

A DOUBLE TRAGEDY.

In Jacksonville, Saturday night, there was a double tragedy. G. W. Trailer shot and killed J. Hardenbrook and then ended his own life. The facts developed before the coroner's jury are as follows:

G. W. Trailer had lived near Drain, Douglas county, for two years past. He arrived in this place with his family two weeks ago. His wife's sister, Miss Sarah L. Beeson, daughter of W. N. Beeson, of Shubel, Clackamas county, came here with them. Mr. Hardenbrook had been paying his addresses to her, and it is understood that they were engaged to be married. Mr. Trailer objected to the marriage, and on several occasions threatened Mr. Hardenbrook's life. The day before the shooting Trailer said Hardenbrook would not live till Sunday, though he gave his consent for him to come to the house to see Miss Beeson.

Last night at 11 o'clock, Miss Beeson, Mrs. Trailer and others were sitting around the stove, when Mr. Trailer walked out on the porch of the house. A few moments later a ball came crashing through the window, and took effect in Mr. Hardenbrook's face about the left eye. He fell forward in his chair but was caught by Miss Beeson, and supported until assistance came from neighbors. He lived an hour but never spoke. After the shooting, Trailer ran to some old buildings 175 yards distant, and shortly shots were heard. Upon investigation it was found that he had shot himself twice, the first taking effect under the chin and tearing away part of the nose and face, and the second entering the head above the nose and carrying away the greater portion of this organ.

The men had never any dispute or personal trouble of any kind, and though Mr. Hardenbrook had been repeatedly warned of threats that had been made against him, paid no attention to them and seemed to feel in no danger. It developed during the examination that Mr. Trailer had not been sound in mind for the past year; that he saw strange visions, and was afflicted with loss of memory. No valid reason was alleged for his antipathy to Hardenbrook, and there appears to have been no cause why he should have had any dislike for him. The shooting was do doubt the result of homicidal insanity, as Mr. Trailer had declared only a short time since that rather than that Mr. Hardenbrook and Miss Beeson should marry, he would kill both of them. The above facts are in accordance with the verdict of the jury.

KILLED BY FALLING TIMBERS

'Doc' Parriott, a man of about 25 years of age, who has been living here for some time, was killed Wednesday while assisting in repairs which were being made on the Rogue River bridge.

A new bent was being put in at the approach on the farther side and the structure was supported by means of false timbers and raised by two jackscrews so that the old timbers could be taken out and new ones put in. The new bent had been raised very nearly to its place, when one of the jackscrews slipped out and the bridge collapsed, the heavy beam of the bent catching Parriott against another beam, crushing and killing him instantly.

Two other men under the bridge escaped miraculously, as one side of the bridge was supported so that it did not reach the ground. Hiram Drake was badly cut about the head and face, but not seriously injured.—Grants Pass Courier.
