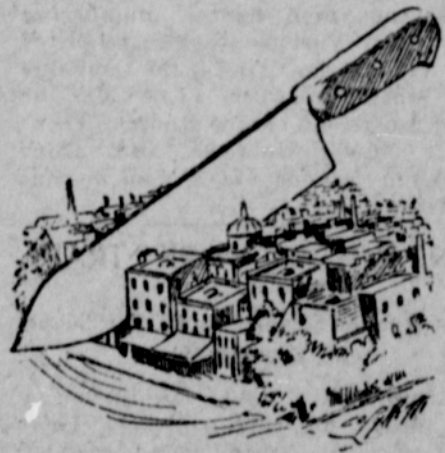

OREGON NOTES

Secretary of State Dunbar is ill and threatened with typhoid fever.

A Baker City firm shipped 13 bicycles to Japan last week. Local Japanese purchased them for friends at home.

The smelter at the copper mines located near Waldo, Josephine county, has been shut down for the season.

Union county is exporting flour to China, apples to Germany and England, and horses, hay and dried prunes to the Philippines.

H. D. McIntosh has sold his placer properties on Wolf and Coyote creeks, comprising 224 acres, or 11 claims, to G. B. Perelli and Wolff & Zwicker, of Portland. The Wolf creek placer consists of 160 acres of land with two water rights and two ditches. The ditches are four miles long and have a pressure of 150 and 190 feet. The claims consist of a gravel channel and the banks are 12 to 30 feet high.

On one side is an attractive map of the state, 18x26 inches, showing the counties, rivers, lakes, mountains, cities and railroads. The other side is devoted to a statement of the resources and productions of the state. Several carefully compiled tables present the wealth of Oregon for easy comprehension. The state is considered by districts, and the characteristics of each are briefly set forth. Six prisoners were received at the penitentiary Friday from Douglas county having been sentenced to terms varying in length from one to five years by Judge Hamilton of the circuit court now in session at Roseburg. Below are given the names of the prisoners together with their crimes and the sentence imposed upon them: Bert Bice,

aged 17 years plead guilty to stealing a horse from Wm. Howard near Myrtle Creek, and was sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of one year. Bice is only a mere lad and owing to his age and the circumstances surrounding the case District Attorney Brown recommended clemency in his case. Bice has two brothers in the reform school. Frank Crogan and John Kelley plead guilty to entering Engineer L. J. Stroud's house with the intention of burglarizing the same and were sentenced to five and two and one-half years respectively in the penitentiary. Patrick Murphy, Patrick Quinn and Thomas Brennan, the three young tramps plead guilty of receiving stolen goods taken from Mrs. Brown's house in Oakland, and were each sentenced to the penitentiary for one year.

The land in Lake county, known as the property of the California and Oregon Land Co., which has been in litigation for years, is now in a fair way to be cleared up as to title. At any rate the public has sufficient confidence in the outcome to invest in these lands, and sales are now being recorded. A section has been sold to Miller & Lane, adjoining Lakeview, the price paid being \$3840. Wm. Harvey has also purchased 1600 acres of land, situated adjoining his ranch at the head of Goose lake valley, paying \$3136 therefor. This land, having been thrown on the market at low figures, will doubtless be sold out readily, and people will come to Lake county to make purchases. The company is assessed in that county alone for 126,499 acres. This would accommodate a hundred or more settlers.

It is not known whether he had any amount of money or not. It was said he was seen to have paid the Mexican for work done, and there is still due him from Alexander & Campbell \$13.

The United States land offices have just received a notice from the department of the interior, which is of the greatest importance to anyone who is in any way interested in taking up government lands. Heretofore, according to law, a person who had commuted, that is, lived on the homestead a portion of the required time, and had then bought the property clear, had exhausted his title to take up another such claim. By the terms of the new law commuters are now entitled to another claim. Persons who have taken a claim and forfeited the same, and lost it from any cause whatsoever, were also previously debarred from taking out a second claim. The new act, however, provides that such may take out a claim in the future as though they had never made use of the right.
