SOUTHERN OREGON HISTORY.

A Letter From W. S. Gall, of Sams Valley.

Editor Gold Hill News, Dear Sir: Will you please allow me space in your valuable paper to correct a few errors concerning the death of my father John R. Hardin, sr. I have in my possession evidence from one who was present, and I herewith submit his statement for publication. Yours Respectfully, JOHN R. HARDIN.

SAMS VALLEY, Ore., March 31st.
John R. Hardin, Dear Nephew— I notice in the Gold Hill News, that you were down to exhumate the remains of your father and the statement that John R. Hardin and an unknown man were both wounded by the Indians. Let me correct the statement. The man who was with your father was Dr. Rose. He was killed dead the first fire from the Indians. Hardin was wounded the third shot and the mare he was riding ran with him out of the way, after which, A. J. Kane, Will Ewing, Rara McLean, James Hawkins and I carried him in a blanket from the Swindon house to Dardinelles fort. Rose laid where he was killed until midnight before he could be brought in. He was stripped of all his clothing. He had one bullet, a half ounce ball through the temples. The Indians had cut his arms and thighs with a knife, and then stuck the knife in both eyes and stomach. Another misstatement is that David Birdsey and Dan Fisher were there. Birdsey was in Jacksonville and Fisher was on Applegate.

Your father died the third day after he was wounded. Any other knowledge you desire I will willingly give. Yours truly,
