MINING NOTES.

Purkypile Bros. are sinking a
winze on a two foot vein of ore on
their Galls Creek property. Every-
thing promises a good mine.

Mansfield Bros. are running a
tunnel on their mine on Black-
well hill to tap the rich ledge they
recently discovered.

John Carney of Central Point was
in Gold Hill Wednesday. He has
started work on his claim the
Salem on Blackwell Hill. His
property adjoins the old Ross claim
now owned by Messrs. Houck and
Haff.

S. C. Nealand, a mining man of
Colorado, is here looking over our
mines and prospecting.

It is rumored that Enos Rhoten
has taken out over a thousand dol-
lars during the past week from
some rich ore found near surface in
the Blackwell Hills. It can be
taken for granted that "Enos" did
not do any deep mining for it.

John Hall has been spending the
week in town from his property on
Grave creek. Mr. Hall has a ledge
four to five feet in width, all of
which carries good values, but
some of the ore is extremely rich
with particles of gold emphatically
visible all through the rock. He
has specimens which are astonish-
ing in their richness and appear as
though the gold had been plenti-
fully besprinkled in them with a
salt shaker.—Courier.

J. Fitzgibbon last week struck 30
inches of rich ore in the lower tun-
nel of the Dixie Queen property on
Foot's creek.

This is a very important strike
as it demonstrates beyond a doubt
the certainty of this pay chute in
depth as this is the same ore body
that they recently milled from in
their surface workings that brought
them over \$100 per ton.

We are pleased to note that J. T.
Hagan, owner of the Tolo mine, has
resumed work. He has erected a
horse power whim at the main
shaft on the Fort Lane ledge which
is now 110 feet in depth and pro-
poses sinking an additional 100
feet as rapidly as two shifts can do
the work. He is now working a
force of six men and will add to
the force as soon as additional
ground is opened. The last 55 feet
of this shaft produced at the rate of
\$80 for every foot of sinking at an
expense of not to exceed \$12 per
foot for the work. * Indications
point to this same chute as extend-
ing to an unknown depth.

crew working on the bridge across
Rogue river this week.

and is 1¼ inches wide. It is flat
and not very thick and is valued
at \$125. It is almost pure gold
showing hardly a trace of quartz
or degrading matte. — Courier.
