We learn that Mr. Stancell, General Manager of the Rogue River Mining Co., has completed arrangements for the erection of a large Lumber mill at, or near, the junction of the middle fork of Footh Creek. This will be placed on the mining ground of our townsman, Mr. J. A. Fitzgibbon who has given them a long term lease on a portion of his ground for this purpose. As we understand it, this company propose putting in a very extensive plant. They have already ordered their machinery, consisting of a 200 H. P. Boiler and engine of like capacity and have received right of way for Steam logging road over the Black Channel Company's ground. Also right of way for Steam logging road down Footh Creek, and propose building a bridge across Rogue river at the mouth of Footh Creek to connect with the R. R. at that point. They have also made arrangements with the R. R. to furnish them with large quantities of wood which is unfit for lumbering purposes. This enterprise will undoubtedly prove a success with the large quantities of timber lands they have received in this vicinity, and will also prove a valuable adjunct to the business interests of Gold Hill. Now is an opportunity for the business men of Gold Hill to secure the trade of this new enterprise and a united effort should be made in this direction. This is the nearest supply point and the trade will naturally gravitate here with an effort on the part of our business men to secure the same.

PARIS, April 14.—"Among the Boer prisoners who recently arrived in Lisbon from Lourenco Marques," says a special dispatch from the Portuguese capital "was a young American, Randolph Martinsen, who described himself as a son of the president of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad. He was captured by the British, but released as an American with a promise not to fight again. Subsequently he was arrested in Lourenco Marques at the request of the British authorities, under suspicion of being a Boer agent. Mr. Martinsen, on being brought here, secured his release through the American charge d'affaires, and his father sent him money to pay his passage home. According to his representations,

he was aid-de-camp to Colonel John Blake, commander of the Irish brigade."

A dispatch to the London Daily Mail from Lourenco Marques, cabled to the Associated Press March 11, said that Mr. Martinsen, who was said to have resigned a post in the United States army to join the Boer forces, had been shipped from Lisbon on the Portuguese transport Zaire, which carried 103 Boer families, after he had made an ineffectual attempt to obtain consular protection.—Oregonian

Engine 2191, in charge of Engineer C. C. Scott, met with quite a mishap near Medford Thursday and came very causing a bad accident. The engine was used in drawing an extra passenger train from the east to Portland, and when between Medford and Phoenix the driving rods on both sides of the engine gave way and nearly caused a bad wreck. The track their being straight and level the train was not much damaged but the track was considerably injured. Engineer Scott sustained some severe bruises but is not seriously hurt.—Ashland Tidings.
