

## Good Horse Sense

Hon. Wm. S. Crowell on Tuesday evening spoke to one of the largest and one of the most enthusiastic audiences that ever gathered at a political meeting in Gold Hill. He is a man whose argument comes with a conviction of truth and right. He spoke for nearly two hours and held the attention of his audience throughout being liberally applauded after each of his many telling points.

He stated fairly to the people that in the result of the election he had no interest whatever other than that of a private citizen. In an elegant manner he thanked the people of Gold Hill for the support given him in the past and told them that ever again would be a candidate or their suffrage.

In speaking of the reduction of the county debt of Jackson county he proved to the people beyond any doubt whatever it was that it was absolutely impossible to make a reduction of the county debt of \$41,000 in one year. He proved conclusively whatever reduction had been made was due to the county court and to the two commissioners neither of whom were candidates this election. He spoke highly of the nominees for the representative ticket, Miles Cantrill, John O'Neil and R. P. Nell. He showed by the many extravagances of the last legislature, against which practice he challenged the members from Jackson county to point to one single dissenting vote they had regretted for economy. He urged the voters to send men to Salem who would not be petitioned in vain. He challenged the republicans to deny the fact that at the last senatorial election over 90 per cent of the republicans of Jackson county were not in favor of the election of H. W. Corbett and he changed the members of the Jackson county delegation with voting against the overwhelming majority.

He spoke highly of the qualifications of each name upon the democratic ticket Rader for sheriff Orth for clerk Jones for assessor Taylor for commissioner and Miller for treasurer. He proved that each were honest and competent. He ridiculed Newbury by stating that John S. Orth was not competent to be county clerk. In beautiful words he told how John had been left a young boy to care for his invalid mother and dependent brothers and sisters, how he had kept his home together and supported his mother and sisters for years. The way the audience cheered left no room to doubt what the people of Gold Hill think of John Orth and the vote he will receive at their hands upon the day when he is elected clerk of Jackson county.

The meeting was a grand success and the large crowd were amply repaid for being present. The speech was simply an honest true statement of what ever one knew to be facts.

## A PLEASANT AFFAIR

The entertainment given Saturday night by the Women's Relief Corps was a success in every particular. The male quartette had their voices tuned to concert pitch and sang songs that were appropriate and melodious, after which the farce entitled "Vici Vera," or Women's Suffrage, was played by the company of versatile artists, which ended the entertainment. Miss Lena Casey rendered the instrumental music in a very able and appreciable manner indeed. John Reed assisted very satisfactory as property man and curtain manipulator. In fact other parties whose names I cannot recall assisted very materially in arranging for the success and pleasure of those present. The net proceeds were \$41.25, which goes to the encampment. Considering the short time in which was devoted to rehearsal the entertainment was very good. If proper arrangements can be made the plays will be repeated at Woodville, Sams Valley and probably Jacksonville in the near future for the purpose of obtaining further funds for the reunion. ## Sad Accident.

On Wednesday evening, the 28th day of May, as the work train was backing from Gold Hill to the Fredenburg gravel pit, when about one-half mile east of Gold Hill the train struck John N. Keyburn and killed him instantly. From the testimony of Conductor G. V. Gillette who was riding on the box car in front of the train, he says the train was running at about eight miles per hour; that when first seen Keyburn was cutting grass near the railroad track with his pocket knife when the train was about 75 yards away. The deceased walked about 30 feet away from the track and remained there until the train got within about the length of a car of him. The next seen of the man he was running across the track immediately in front of the box car which was being pushed by the train. Conductor Gillette signaled the engineer to stop, but too late—the car struck the deceased in the back of the head, killing him instantly. Dr. Pickle was notified and he came down and empaneled the following jurors:

Geo. R. Hammersly, Nort Eddings, A. L. Vincent, S. V. McFaren, F. Yantes, and Richard Walker. After being duly sworn they returned the following verdict:

We the coroner's jury, summoned to enquire into the death of the deceased, find his name was John H. Keyburn of San Francisco, Calif., about 32 years old; by occupation a peddler; that he came to his death on the railroad track one-half mile east of Gold Hill on May the 28th, at 7:50 o'clock p. m. by being hit by a box car in the back of the head. We further find that the employees of the S. P., who was in charge of the train, was in nowise to blame for the accident.

The deceased has a brother who was communicated with by telegraph and who will arrive here on Friday, the 30th. From the circumstances it looks as though the man saw his dog was crossing the track to come to where he was, and thinking the train would run over the little fellow he decided he would cross the track to the dog, but he was not quick enough—the train caught him just as he was across the track.
