Hoar's Speech in the Senate.

"You are fighting for sovereignty," he said, "you are fighting for the principle of eternal dominion over that people, and that is the only question in issue in the conflict."

Senator Hoar said that the share which it was proposed to give the Filipinos in the proposed scheme of government was an admission that many of them were fit for self government.

The United States were fighting to secure a dependency, not a republic; a government of our making and not a government of the Filipinos making.

Discussing the testimony taken by the Philippine commission, Senator Hoar said it had contained some pregnant admissions. What vindicated that which has been done so far in the saving of the islands from anarchy and the material benefit conferred upon the Philippine people.

He compared the situation in Cuba with that of the Philippines and demanded to know which was the better.

This government has erected a republic in Cuba, and a despotism in the Philippines. Six hundred millions of treasure and 10,000 lives had been sacrificed in that endeavor.

In the Philippines the American flag had been made the emblem of sacrilege and the burning of houses and of the houses of the war torturer. He believed that our officers, in general, were humane.

But in some cases they had carried on warfare with a mixture of American ingenuity and Castilian cruelty.

"What have your ideals cost you?" inquired Senator Hoar. "For the Philippine islands you have had to repeal the declaration of independence. For Cuba you have had to reaffirm it and give it new lustre. For the Philippine islands you have had to convert the Monroe doctrine into a doctrine of mere selfishness.

For Cuba you have acted on it, and vindicated it. In Cuba you have the eternal gratitude of a free people. In the Philippines you have the hatred and sullen submission of a subjugated people. From Cuba you have brought home nothing but glory. From the Philippines you have brought home nothing of glory."

Referring to the cruelties committed in the Philippines, Senator Hoar said he believed the American soldiers were as brave and humane as ever lived. They had done simply what always would be done in like conditions. The chief guilt was upon the heads of those who created the conditions.

In conclusion Senator Hoar believed that better counsel yet would prevail than now seemed to exist.

Spontaneous applause swept over the senate and the galleries at the conclusion of the speech. Such a demonstration is very unusual on the floor of the senate. So pronounced was it that the presiding officer called the attention of the senators to the rule prohibiting any expression of approval or disapproval.

At the conclusion of Senator Hoar's speech at 2:55 the senate took a recess for 30 minutes in order that its members might partake of an Oregon salmon luncheon given by Senator Mitchell of Oregon. The proceedings were so unusual as to give rise to considerable comment.

A bill was passed to establish an assay office at Portland, Ore.

Senator Teller then addressed the senate on the Philippine government bill, discussing at length the action of congress on the establishment of the republic of Cuba.
