EX-SHERIFF NEILON GETS FOUR YEARS. Unable to secure Bail, the Lake county Ex-Sheriff Goes to Jail.

At Lakeview this week Circuit Judge, H. L. Benson over-ruled the motion of the defence for a new trial in the case of the State vs. Ex-Sheriff A. J. Neilon, convicted by a jury of embezzling \$3000 of Lake county's money while sheriff.

Judge Benson then sentenced Neilon to serve four years in the state penitentiary and pay a fine of \$6000, but granted a stay of execution, pending an appeal to the supreme court.

Neilon was unable to secure bonds and was placed in the county jail at Lakeview.

LAND OFFICE SENSATIONS. Looked upon as a Scheme to Grab the Best Timber.

ALBANY, Oct. 30.—The action of the secretary of the interior with regard to filings on timber lands is looked upon by local timber men here as a scheme to "gobble" the best timber claims with scrip. The action stops all filing on timber claims until the pending investigation is settled. The investigation might be held up for six months or at any rate, long enough for men who hold scrip to lay it on the best claims and in this way scoop the individual claim takers out of their best interests.

This alleged sentiment may also prove to have been installed with a view to diverting attention from the pending investigation concerning rumored timber frauds. Agents of the government are soon expected here and a good deal of interest is taken in the coming inquiry.

Capt. S. B. Ormsby, superintendent of the forest rangers for the protection of Oregon timber which is in the government reserve, is in Albany, taking evidence on government land claims.

The above dispatch misconstrues the order of the land department, as timber entries are being received as usual at the land offices—only action on former filings is suspended.—Roseburg Review.
