- 12 tablespoons (liquid) equals 1 cup
- 16 tablespoons (dry) equals 1 cup.
- 2 cups equals 1 pint.
- 2 tablespoons butter equals 1 ounce.
- 4 tablespoons flour equals 1 ounce.
- 2 tablespoons gr. sugar equals 1 oz.
- 2 tablespoons liquid equals 1 ounce.
- 1 square Bakers' choc. equals 1 ounce
- 4 cups sifted flour equals 1 pound.
- 2 cups granulated sugar equals 1 pound.
- Juice of 1 lemon equals 3 tablespoons.

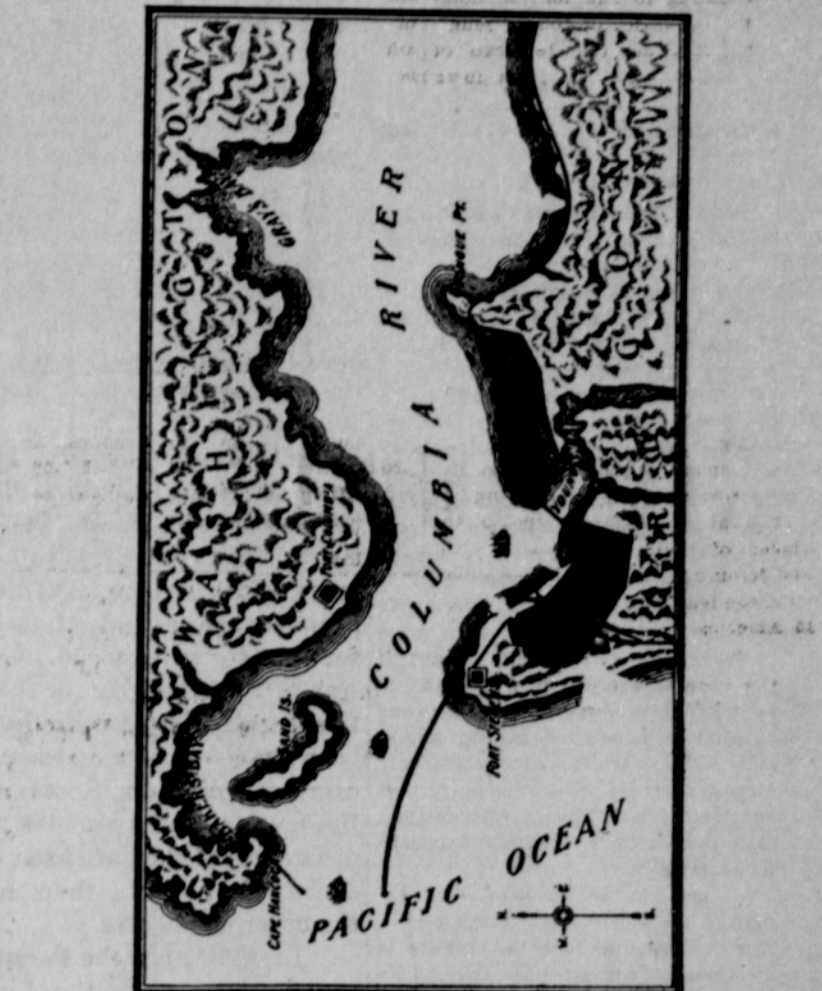

Columbia Harbor, the Great Seaport of the Northwest



Good sea ports are mighty scarce on the Pacific Coast of the United States, and north of San Francisco there are only two—two good ones—Puget Sound and the mouth of the Columbia river, and by far the best of these is the latter.

Pacific Coast's Greatest Harbor
It has many advantages over all other ports on this coast. It's the only one with a water level haul back to the whole inland country and it's the only first class fresh water harbor in the United States.

It is large enough and deep enough to accommodate the largest ships now building in different countries to ply through the Panama canal, with good anchorage, without danger of unseen reefs. It has about 50,000,000,000 feet of the finest standing timber in the country right around it that will be cut there. Clatsop county alone contains about 18,000,000,000 feet.

Northwest's Natural Gateway
It is the natural gateway to the whole northwest, and, with the completion of the Panama canal, it will show the greatest rush of development of any section of the whole coast. Warrenton, Oregon, is the place where the real rush will take place because both the Hill and Harriman interests have purchased terminals there and because the big ships from the east will bring their freight through the canal to this point to meet the tonnage of the Inland Empire. This will be the greatest factory, mill and distributing point of the whole northwest.

Hill and Harriman Both There
J. J. Hill paid \$6,000,000 for the Astoria & Columbia River railroad when he knew it cost but \$1,800,000; and the builders were offered \$7,000,000 by E. H. Harriman before the deal was consummated. Both Hill and Harriman have large holdings at Warrenton worth several million of dollars.

One of the greatest of national marine projects is under way at the mouth of the Columbia river involving an expenditure of \$6,000,000.

The Canning Industry
Net to the fish canneries are \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000 each year. Salmon alone add \$3,000,000 to the wealth of Astoria and Clatsop counties.
This port has been endorsed as the natural, the cheapest, the inevitable great outlet to the Pacific by the transportation giants of America—Clark, Huntington, Hill and Harriman. Now J. J. Hill ratifies it by spending \$45,000,000 for his new line down the sound today?

Resources, Climate and Scenery
There are unlimited resources in farming, dairying and stock raising of all kinds surrounding Warrenton. The climate is delightful: no hot weather in the summer and no cold weather in the winter. Trees and grass are as green as an emerald in December and January and the snowy crests of Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Hood in the distance gleam white and dazzling in July and August. The mean maximum temperature annually for 40 years past shows 57.3; mean minimum 39.3. The general average from April

1 to October 1 is 60.5 and from October 1 to April 1 is 43.3.

The Salmon Industry
Only a few people probably realize the value in dollars and cents of the salmon shipped yearly from the Columbia river to the markets of the world, but when compared with the shipments of wheat the salmon trade makes a most creditable showing.

President Stone of the Astoria Commercial club and general manager of the Elmo Canning Co., one of the largest packers of salmon on the Pacific coast, makes the following comparative statement of the salmon packed on the Columbia river and in Alaska and at coast points and brought there for shipment to the markets and of the wheat shipped from the Columbia river district during the period from June 1, 1911 to January 31, 1912.

According to President Stone's figures the total number of cases of canned salmon packed last season at various points and brought to Astoria for shipment was: Alaska, 157,650; Columbia River, 425,000; coast of Oregon and California, 190,018; total, 772,668. The value of the various kinds of salmon shipped from the Columbia river during the period was 772,668 cases canned salmon, at \$5.50 a case, \$4,249,674; 85,000 tierces of pickled salmon at \$100 a tierce, \$8,500,000; 800,000 pounds frozen fish, at 11 cents a pound, \$88,000; total value, \$5,154,674.

In the same period there were 6,575,377 bushels of wheat shipped out of the Columbia river district to various ports and this at 80 cents a bushel had a value of \$5,260,301.60, or only about \$100,000 more than the value of the salmon.

New York 70 Years Ago
Seventy years ago New York began its great change into a big city. Up to that time its harbor had been called a gangway to Albany. The first railroad in the United States had recently been built and a road was planned to go down the Hudson. The Albany papers ridiculed it as a fool's project and wound up by declaring that New York could never be more than a gangway to Albany. How does that bank of the Columbia to get there. There is a reason for all this.
