Boycotters Tackle Oregon Buzzsaw

THE Gold Hill News, published by Rex H. Lampman,
is being boycotted by a half dozen would-be mer-
chants of that town because he dared to print the truth
about crooks and their crooked ways, and who boast they
will starve him out and make him walk out of town.
During the past thirty-five years as a journalist in sev-
eral states of the union, we have never yet read of a
boycott against a newspaper that the boycotters didn't
get the worst of it, and this handful of brainless busi-

hides a skeleton, and theirs is no exception to the rule.

archs tremble and frees us from the ignorance of the
savage in the jungle, and the sooner all criminals in
retirement and smart-alecks who think they know how
to run a newspaper without brains—get wise or in the
pen—where they belong, all good people will rejoice and
this end of God's most favored footstool will boom in a
way that will make other sections sick. Slide down that
Gold Hill, Brother Rex, and visit Dorris, the Little
Queen of Butte Valley, where newspaper boycotters are
as scarce as snowflakes in hades and all tight-wads and
crooks show a healthy respect for our "buzz-saw".

School Election Next Monday

SCHOOL MEETINGS will be held throughout the state on
June 17. Notwithstanding their real importance these meet-
ings are usually entirely neglected by taxpayers. The law pro-
vides for a couple of little written notices to be tacked on a tree
or other place, and as nobody reads these notices or even sees
them, it generally happens that the school meeting is over before
any one knows it has been called. It is astonishing that under
this wretched method the schools are as well conducted as they
are. Whenever possible, the school officers should be elected at
the same time and places, using the same ballot, as are the
municipal officers. Then people would take an interest.—Grants
Pass Observer.

The above remarks are indeed timely. One of the most impor-
tant of the voters duties is to see that proper persons are placed
in charge of the educational machinery of the community. If im-
proper persons have held the reins in school matters in Gold
Hill of late years, it is largely the fault of the individual voter.
Everyone who has a vote should use it next Monday. By
reason of the absurd terms of statute governing school election,
you cannot vote if you do not pay taxes, and even if you are a
taxpayer you may be deprived of your vote by the hair-splitting
interpretation which may be placed on the law.

But if you have a vote, it is not only your privilege but your
duty to use it. Here is the law applying to school districts of the
second class, to which class Gold Hill was advanced by the last
census, which gave us over two hundred children of school age:

SEC. 167. QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS.

Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is twenty-
one years of age and has resided in the district thirty
days immediately preceding the meeting or election, and
has property in the district, as shown by the last county
assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he
or she is liable or subject to pay a tax, shall be entitled to
vote at any school meeting or election in said district;
provided, that, for the purpose of this section, any man who
has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United
States, and has resided in the state for six months immedi-
ately preceding the meeting or election where he proposes
to vote, shall be considered a citizen of this state; provid-
ed, further, that any person shall be deemed to have com-
plied with the property qualifications imposed by this sec-
tion who presents to the directors or judges of election satis-
factory evidence that he or she has stock, shares, or owner-
ship in any corporation, firm, or co-partnership which has
property in the district, as shown by the last county as-
sessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which such
corporation, firm, or co-partnership pays a tax, even
though his or her individual name does not appear upon
the tax roll.

tice, orthography, English literature.
Friday Afternoon—Oregon school law,
botany, algebra, city government.
Saturday Forenoon—Geometry, geology.
Saturday Afternoon—General history,
bookkeeping.

Questions in theory and practice will
be taken from Colgrove's "The Teacher
and the School". Questions in methods
will be taken from "White's Art of
Teaching."

All teachers who intend to write upon
this examination are requested to notify
me as soon as possible.

Kitchen Weights and Measures
The following valuable table of
weights and measures for kitchen use
has been prepared by the domestic
science department of the Oregon Ag-
ricultural College:
3 teaspoons equal 1 tablespoon.
12 tablespoons (liquid) equals 1 cup
16 tablespoons (dry) equals 1 cup.
2 cups equals 1 pint.

2 tablespoons butter equals 1 ounce.
4 tablespoons flour equals 1 ounce.
2 tablespoons gr. sugar equals 1 oz.
2 tablespoons liquid equals 1 ounce.
1 square Bakers' choc. equals 1 ounce
4 cups sifted flour equals 1 pound.
2 cups granulated sugar equals 1
pound.
Juice of 1 lemon equals 3 table-
spoons.
