Walter S. Redfield returned to Sacramento on Sunday afternoon last, having spent the previous week in this city upon a visit to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Redfield. Redfield, jr., who has traveled extensively, was vastly satisfied with Gold Hill and the Rogue River Valley, stating that he was better pleased with climatic conditions in this section than of any other part of the Pacific coast.

Tom Dungey, who grows big berries of all sorts, and lots of them, at Pleasant-view ranch on Galls creek, is now marketing a fair crop of raspberries and logans. While Mr. Dungey is very well satisfied with the yield, he states that it would have been larger by several hundred crates but for a severe hail storm several weeks ago and the recent heavy rain, which scattered much of the ripening fruit upon the ground.

Oats 5½ feet in height are on display at the Redfield real estate sanetum, where they are daily impressing the stranger in our midst with the fertility of Rogue river dirt and the salubrity of Rogue river climate. The sample is no mere selection, but was plucked at hazard from the forty-five acre field of oats on the Braden ranch, under lease to R. L. Darling and S. T. Hodges. Not alone have the oats flourished under the direction of Messrs. Darling and Hodges, but the remainder of the big ranch is predicted to bring forth a record crop of hay and grain.

C. W. Martin, of the California-Oregon company, gave an equestrian exhibit on Front street Friday evening last, narrowly escaping serious injury when his mount became frightened at the approach of train No. 14. "Biddy", Doc Hutson's favorite saddle mare, with a previously unblemished repete for tractibility, bucked like an intamed broncho in the rodero, and after several exciting minutes of struggle for mastery, pitched her rider over the bridle to the street. Mr. Martin arose with no more serious injury than a pronounced limp, and No. 14 pulled northward with passengers and crew vastly entertained.

Under supervision of lineman Fred Edings the California-Oregon company completed a lighting and power line to the Riverside addition of Gold Hill the first of the week. The new line is three-quarters of a mile in extent, and taps the fertile truck gardening district of the city along the north bank of the Rogue. Subscribers who have signed contracts for service on the new line, and who have hitherto been slaves of the kerosene lamp, are T. N. Anderson, Martin Erlwein, Ike Coy, Charles Riedel, D. Horn and T. B. Roberts. A number of other residents will wire their homes and install the new service within the near future. C. W. Martin, who plans the extension campaigns of the power company, is authority for the statement that this line will be continued to Rock Point, a distance of 2½ miles, during the present summer.

Deputy warden Riley Hammersley came in from the woods Wednesday afternoon, to purchase provisions and gossip with friends. With the assistance of deputy warden Fred Merritt, Riley recently apprehended a poacher in the Cow creek country and haled him before a Glendale justice for judgement. The poacher, squatted at Happy Camp, had a prime quarter of venison in his possession when the wardens visited him, ostensibly as forest rangers. In view of the fact that the offender was of poor circumstances the fine of \$50 was, upon petition of the wardens making the arrest, remitted by the justice, and the poacher released with a severe admonition to poach no more.

Turtle Rock ranch, one of the finest properties in upper Sams Valley, has been leased for a term of five years to L. C. Applegate and Ned Potter, of this city. Messrs. Potter and Applegate took possession of the ranch immediately after the signature of the contract the first of this week, and will harvest the present season's crop. The Turtle Rock ranch comprises 160 acres, a large proportion of the tract being under cultivation, with a fine five acre pear orchard in full bearing. It is owned by E. C. Roenisch, of Minneapolis, who spent the greater part of the week in this city completing the deal, leaving for the return journey Wednesday. For the past several years the ranch has been operated by his son, Harold Roenisch, who will depart during the next fortnight to accept a position in Calgary, where an elder brother is located in the grain business. Until the purchase of the Turtle Rock ranch by Mr. Roenisch, it was owned by Silas Fleming, of this city.
