The "Eagle" mine, three miles south of this city and adjoining the noted "Millionaire", a portion of the Braden estate, has been leased for a twelve-month period by Messrs. E. R. Barter and H. Gummow. Both shaft and tunnel are at present flooded and may not be worked until an engine and pump have been installed. The partners declare themselves to be after pockets, for which the mine has an established reputation, but if milling ore of sufficient worth is encountered in their investigation of the vein, they will ship it to the nearest smelter for treatment.

The band boys bravely sustained their reputation as entertainers at the dance given on Saturday evening last, when forty couples thoroughly enjoyed the evening as guests of the organization. To be sure, tickets of entrance were only secured after a trifling financial transaction, but the good time more than recompensed the contributors; and the band and orchestra—the latter providing the sweet strains—made substantial additions to their cash on hand. With the proceeds of this occasion and the savings of other successful entertainments, the band boys have completed payment for the recently erected band stand, which cost \$75. Tonight they are billed to give a free open air concert at the new stand.

With the passing of Isaac Wright another of the old guards of Jackson county pioneer days has crossed the last divide. For many years past Mr. Wright had been an invalid, and the summons which relieved him of suffering in his seventy-eighth year was not unexpected. He passed away at his home in Rogueriver on Monday of this week, funeral services being conducted at the residence and the

remains conveyed to Medford, where he was laid to rest in the I.O.O.F. cemetery. For a number of years "Uncle Ike," as he was familiarly known, was a resident and business man of Gold Hill, removing about ten years since to Klamath Falls and later to Rogueriver. J. W. Hayes, Nort Eddings, and Mrs. J. H. Beeman, of this city, attended the last rites at the Medford cemetery.

The delegation to Klamath Falls and Jack Morrill's alfalfa ranch returned on Saturday evening last after passing the greater part of the week as guests of Mr. Morrill in an auto tour through Klamath county. At upper Klamath Lake the party ventured forth upon the deep to test the far famed fighting qualities of the big rainbow trout upon which the astute Klamath real-estate lay so much stress. The trout were on the job, alright, everybody landed one or several, but the ten and a half pounder, the real pride of the expedition was landed by Jack Morrill. Judged from the fighting standards of the gamey Rogue river steel heads, the party did not esteem the rainbows highly, save when crumbed lightly and served brown. The return trip carried them to within four miles of Crater Lake, where the car was stalled by impassable road conditions and snow, thus preventing the visit planned. The run to Medford from Klamath Falls was reeled off in 4 hours, 25 minutes—which is believed to establish a new record for the road. Approximately the distance is 85 miles, with much of the highway in a condition unfit for fast driving. Those comprising the party were, Jack Morrill, H. D. Reed, Sprague Riegel and Fred Dodge.

"Prunes, Pills and Print", three live ones from Roseburg on a Seeing Southern Oregon vacation excursion, slowed down for the speed limit and route instructions to Crater Lake at this city on Wednesday afternoon. Manifestly the lure of the Rogue was strong in all three, for they travelled in fishing costume and spoke of steelhead trout—ten pounders—to be taken at the first camp up-river. The party will visit Crater Lake—negotiating the July snow-drifts if necessary to reach that scenic Mecca of the southern country, and will travel by easy stages through the remainder of their itinerary, which includes Klamath Falls, Fort Klamath, return to Grants Pass, thence to Crescent City, Bandon, and back to Roseburg—with a full quota of experiences. "Prunes", of the trio, is Frank Brown, of Brown's Fair Acres, a well known Roseburg fruit grower, "Pills" is W. F. Chapman, of the Red Cross pharmacy in that city, and "Print" is E. E. Wimberly, of the Roseburg Review. While ostensibly out to admire and enjoy southern Oregon, the three guardsmen carry attractive cards which set forth in catchy jingles the fame of Roseburg and the Umpqua valley. These they are scattering out by the way, but merely in the genial spirit of getting back at the local booster who seeketh to persuade.
