Other changes have been made that, in the opinion of the revision committee appointed by the recent mass meeting, added largely to the strength of the charter. The measure must either be voted in its entirety or rejected as a whole. The News has no comment to offer at the present time save that it regards the amendments as being all for the public good, and its adoption essential to our city government. If rejected the old instrument will remain in operation, and the errors it is striven to strike out will still remain—a source of civic trouble and annoyance, necessitating yet another election.
