WHAT a melodistic treat it must have been, indeed, when Representative Hawley of Oregon organized a glee club of honorable triflers one recent June afternoon, and led the tuneful triflers in that dear old sob song, entitled "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean."

True, there was other business toward—though the House was at a temporary tie-up—but it is conceded by his admirers that the Honorable Hawley is doubtless so well informed on matters of prospective legislation as to render ineffectual any attempt to improve his perspicacity during an interlude. Led by the Oregon congressman the clever cut-ups warbled for a time at the strains of "My Old Kentucky Home." As the press dispatches so succinctly stated, "it was an unusual scene."

Oregon is proud of the Honorable Hawley's versatility, of his tendency to uphold the traditions of decorum and dignity in the halls of Congress. And, we inquire of the effete and enfeebled East, where save from the West could have arisen a troubador to charm his congressional colleagues with more or less tuneful song. What an inspiration must this example have been—what an establishment of precedent for horse play!

Was it an omen that the last lingering strains of the Kentucky melody quavered at "g-o-o-d n-i-g-h-t"? Speak, mysterious messenger—is it "good night" for Hawley, the singing solon of the lower house?

OFF AT A TANGENT

EX-SENATOR Jonathan Bourne is off at a tangent from the ideas and interests of the people, whom he so long and ably represented.

Bourne is an authority on matters of transportation, the traffic and commerce of the nation, and ought that he may say in relation thereto carries weight like John Gilpin on his famous ride. Therefore we may well "view with alarm" his suggestion that railroads be paid for mail service at a rate corresponding to passenger returns.

Bourne makes no secret of the fact that this would increase the cost to the government. The burden, in turn, would be placed upon the letter writing public and the publisher. How far distant would this remove the penny post reform, now almost at the threshold of attainment?

We are sincerely sorry for the railroads—almost as sorry as Jonathan appears to be—but, as has been frequently and freely suggested, there is one course open to them. They can let go at any time.

Meanwhile, with passenger and freight rates that eclipse those elsewhere, and with letter postage at two cents while the penny post prevails and pays in other nations, the public will be found firmly opposed to any increase of tribute.

Not even the plausible representations of Jonathan Bourne shall avail.

Notice to Water Users

Attention is called to the Gold Hill City Ordinance regulating the use and abuse of water.

The rules adopted and approved by the City Council and the State Railroad Commission provide irrigating hours from 5 to 8 A. M. and 5 to 8 P. M., and a penalty for waste of water.

Furthermore, the water charge for irrigating is only about one-half the amount that can be charged, and from now on will be charged, all who do not strictly observe the hours for irrigating.

No garden needs irrigating every day.

Consumers unable to use water at time others are irrigating may, by calling at the office of the Company, make special arrangement for water at other hours, should conditions warrant such privilege.

This shall be due notice of the increased charge for those the inspectors find using water out of hours.

Mrs. Harvey has given to her family, and to the world, the example of a beautiful Christian life. She was always a faithful worker in the church, true to her Saviour and ever ready with a helping hand to those about her—a good woman, highly esteemed by all who knew her.

She leaves to mourn her death, her husband, her two daughters, one brother, J. T. Miller, of Florence, Oregon, and her sister, Mrs. B. W. Dean, who resides at Port Orford, Oregon. Also many other relatives, and a host of friends in Gold Hill and vicinity who knew and associated with her all her life.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. church Tuesday forenoon, and conducted by her pastor, Rev. A. Coslet. A quartet rendered three select songs, which were her favorites in life—they were sung with much feeling. A deep sentiment of sorrow pervaded the large audience who had gathered to show their love and esteem.

The floral offering was exceptionally fine, the casket being covered with choice selections of the many varieties of flowers grown here.

Interment was made in the Sams Valley cemetery, and the remains laid to rest by the side of her parents, who had preceded her a few years before.

EX-VICE-PRESIDENT DEAD

Adlai E. Stevenson Passes Away at The Age of 78.

Chicago.—Adlai E. Stevenson, former vice president of the United States, died here at the Presbyterian hospital. His death was due to general debility and old age.

Adlai Ewing Stevenson had a long and honorable public career. He was vice president from 1893 to 1897, under President Grover Cleveland. In 1909 he again was nominated by the democratic party for vice president and ran with William J. Bryan, the party's candidate for president, but was defeated. He served as a member of the 44th and 46th congresses. From 1885 to 1889 he served as First Assistant Postmaster General under President Cleveland.

Fatal Storm in Paris.

Paris.—Eleven persons are believed to have been killed, an unknown number injured and heavy damage to property resulted from a thunder and rain storm of phenomenal violence which raged over Paris for three hours. The strike of the 10,000 employees of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing company has spread to the Union Switch & Signal company, says a report from Pittsburgh.

The General Federation of Women's Clubs, in convention at Chicago, went on record as favoring votes for women.

The National Association of Mexican war veterans met for its annual reunion at Chillicothe, O., less than a dozen members being in attendance. The parade was led by a man 90 years old.

The total number of Americans who have registered at the Brazilian legation at Mexico City and declared their intention to remain in Mexico at their own risk is 1271. Only 300 of these persons live outside the capital.

The money for operating the department would be derived from a tax upon the estates of dead persons appraised at \$50,000 or more and from appropriations that may be made for the purpose. The tax on estates shall not be less than 10 per cent and may be graduated above that percentage by law.
