The Braden and Bill Nye mines closed Thursday afternoon for an indefinite period. Thirty-five men are jobless as a result of the closing down. Both mines are heavily represented by European capital, and the present war on the continent is assigned as a cause for the suspension of operations.

C. F. Bowman died Saturday afternoon at his home in this city, after several years' illness from tuberculosis. For six months Mr. Bowman was an inmate of the state hospital for the treatment of the disease, but was returned to his home several weeks ago as beyond medical assistance. Since that time his death had been almost daily expected. He was a resident of Gold Hill for a number of years, and leader of the socialist faction in this city. He was born in Stockholm, Sweden, 1861, and in early life emigrated to America. His wife, two sons, and a daughter survive him. Funeral services and interment were conducted at the Jacksonville cemetery on Sunday afternoon. The youngest son, Eugene Bowman, died but a week prior to his father's demise, and the whole-hearted sympathy of Gold Hill is extended to the family in their double bereavement.

The forest and brush lands of this vicinity are adding their quota to the general pall of smoke that now hangs over the valley from burning timber in southern Oregon and northern California. The Braden fire, supposedly of incendiary origin, has been subdued, but another fire is now in progress on Kane's creek. For a time this blaze threatened the Lewis ranch and other property in that district, but prompt efforts of fire fighters averted the immediate danger. On Sardine creek to the north a fire is reported to be sweeping the hills in the vicinity of the Moore saw mill. Still another is in evidence on the Sardine creek divide, being plainly visible from this city. This fire originated in the spring gulch on the High Line trail and swept rapidly to the crest of the divide. The woods are tinder-like from the long drouth, and the promised rainfall of the past few days is anxiously wished for.

BODGE BLAMED FOR SHOOTING HENRY OLSON

Dodge had told for the second time of hearing the chug-chug of hoofs in the brush, by asking for the hobnailed shoes the dead man wore, and asking if they would make a noise like hoofs on the bedrock of the creek bottom. Olson also testified a man could tell the color of the eyes at the distance between Dodge and the victim.

Olson wore a checked shirt, and H. O. Childreth testified that while packing the body out through a dark canyon at 8 o'clock at night the party was able to distinguish the shirt easily.

After five minutes' deliberation the coroner's jury returned its verdict. A formal complaint will be filed in the justice court this afternoon by Prosecutor Kelly. Dodge will be released upon bonds to insure his appearance before the fall grand jury and will probably waive the preliminary hearing. Attorney C. D. Briggs of Ashland is his attorney.
