CARRANZA GETS EMPHATIC NOTE

United States Insists on Early
Change to Improved Con-
ditions in Mexico.

Washington.—General Carranza has been informed in a note from the United States government that unless there is an improvement in conditions with respect to foreigners and their interests in Mexican territory under his control, such steps as may be necessary will be taken by the American government to obtain the desired protection.

The note is the strongest and most emphatic document that has been sent by the Washington government to Mexico since the correspondence with Huerta a year ago. Carranza is warned that the United States has viewed with deep concern the growing complaints by foreigners generally against his administration of affairs and now, in effect, demands an early change.

In the meantime some movements of American warships have been ordered, the effect of which will be a naval demonstration such as, it is hoped by some officials, will convince General Carranza of the determination of the American government to obtain a change in conditions in Mexico City.

Thaw Trial Begins.

New York.—In the room where he twice faced a jury for the murder of Stanford White, Harry Kendall Thaw went on trial for conspiring to escape from the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan.

WETS MAKE LAST STAND

New Bill Introduced at Olympia Would
Save Breweries.

Olympia, Wash.—Before packed galleries and with interest keyed up to such a pitch that Governor Lister was drawn from the executive mansion to the house chamber, wet forces, after a vote of 43 to 43 on a question of procedure, deserted the pending liquor measure and offered a new bill in the last effort to save the breweries of the state.

Eleven members of the house were absent when the test came that inspired the wets to change front.

The new wet bill would bar all sale of intoxicating liquors in the state, but would allow breweries to continue operation for export trade, Chairman Manogue, of the public morals committee, said, proposing submission of this question at a special election before the prohibition law becomes operative.

Wilson Abandons San Francisco Trip.
Washington.—President Wilson definitely abandoned his proposed trip to San Francisco this month to attend the Panama-Pacific International exposition. The grave international situation and the Mexican developments were given out as the reason for this action.

Bryan Takes New Private Secretary.

Washington.—Harvey B. Ferguson of Albuquerque, N. M., who retired as a member of the house, became private secretary to Secretary Bryan Saturday.

SHIP THREATENED BY FIRE ARRIVES SAFELY

Paris.—Fire which threatened the French steamship La Touraine was brought under control and all her passengers are safe. The ship proceeded under her own steam to Havre, her destination. Only the Rotterdam, of the fleet which responded to Captain Caussin's wireless call for aid, stood by as a measure of precaution to give assistance should any be required.

Commanders of other vessels which speeded to the rescue were informed that their services would not be required.

Grave fears for the safety of La Touraine were felt in this city until the positive announcement was made that she was in no danger.

On board La Touraine were 4594 cases of cartridges intended for use in the European war. There were 84 passengers on board, of whom 38 were in the first cabin. Her crew numbered about 200.

Klamath Falls.—A second invasion of Klamath county to procure horses for light artillery was made this week by representatives of the French government. Horses weighing in the neighborhood of 1200 pounds are desired, and the average price paid is \$100 a head. The last purchase made here for France netted the local horsemen \$30,000.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout
the State During the Past
Week.

Chinese Accused of Homestead Fraud.

La Grande.—Toy Young, probably the best known Chinese in eastern Oregon, was arrested by a deputy United States marshal on a charge of making a false affidavit in connection with an application he recently made for a homestead near North Powder. The entry was made at the land office in this city. In making it, he swore he did not have more than 160 acres of land in his own possession at the time. It is averred that he had a large tract of land near Telocaset, which would cancel his right to the claim.

C. A. Smith Timber Sold.

Albany.—Through a deed filed in the county recorder's office here the C. A. Smith Timber company, of Minneapolis, sold its entire holdings in Linn county, embracing 45,405 acres, to the Continental Timber Land company, a Delaware corporation.

This is all timber land, and includes one of the finest bodies of timber in the state. The consideration is given in the deed as \$1, but the instrument bore \$147.50 worth of revenue stamps, which indicates a purchase price of \$147,500.

Want Produce Sold at Cost.

Eugene.—The socialists of Eugene have asked the city council to submit to the voters at the April election a charter amendment empowering the city council to levy a small tax for the erection of a building for a public market and "welfare center." At the market foodstuffs will be sold at cost by the city plus the expense of conducting the market. Provision is to be made for a free medical and dental clinic for the poor of the city with offices in the market building.

INTERSTATE BRIDGE BEGUN

Occasion is Celebrated With Speeches
by Representative Men of 2 States.

Portland.—With hundreds of Portland and Vancouver citizens massed around a roped off square marking the site of the first concrete pier of the interstate bridge, with an exchange of speeches of felicitation and prophecies of the future greatness of the "twin cities," actual work on the colossal viaduct that is to unite two states was begun at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The ceremony of celebration was held on the sandy beach of Hayden island, near the Oregon landing of the Vancouver ferry.

Brief talks were made by members of the commercial clubs of Portland and Vancouver, who carried on the campaign that resulted in the issuance of bonds for the bridge, \$1,250,000 worth by Multnomah county and \$500,000 worth by Clarke county, Washington. Mayor Milton Evans, of Vancouver; Commissioner W. L. Brewster, representing the city of Portland; President W. P. Connaway of the Vancouver Commercial club; Commissioners Rufus C. Holman, W. L. Lightner and Philo Holbrook, of Multnomah county, and John Lyle Harrington, engineer in charge of the bridge, also were among the speakers.

Arrangements for the celebration were made by a committee of the Vancouver Commercial club composed of E. E. Beard, chairman; W. C. Bates, J. P. Stapleton, A. J. Dorland and P. J. Flynn.

Want Fortification of Coast Harbors.

Salem.—The need of fortifying Grays and Willapa harbors against foreign invasion is emphasized in a memorial adopted by the Washington state legislature, a copy of which was received by the secretary of state here, the matter to be submitted to the next session of the Oregon legislature. The memorial calls upon congress to take action to protect these harbors, which it states are wholly without means of repelling an attack.

Mt. Angel Celebrates Road Completion

Mount Angel.—Fifteen hundred people helped to drive the golden spike at the completion of the Willamette Valley Southern railroad electric at Mount Angel Saturday. Rev. Abbot Placidus, president of Mount Angel college, after driving the golden spike, was presented with a six-foot golden spike by the Mount Angel Commercial club.

The allied French and English fleets are making progress in their attack on the forts of the Dardanelles, according to the British admiralty and unofficial reports.

RUSSIAN ARMIES RESUME OFFENSIVE

From Baltic to Rumanian Border
Forces Begin Forward
Movement.

London.—Except in the central Beskid pass of the Carpathians, where the fierce Austrian attacks have moderated somewhat, the Russians are now on the offensive along the whole length of their extremely long line from the Baltic sea to the Rumanian border. Apparently they have definitely disposed of the German and Austrian attempts to outflank their two extreme wings, and having turned, are making slow but steady progress westward.

In the Beskid, Tukholka and Ussok passes the Austro-Germans are in possession of strong positions, whence they are continually attacking the Russians, while in the western passes, especially the Dukla, the Russians are on the Hungarian slopes, where the fighting has degenerated into trench warfare.

In northern Poland the Russians are advancing slowly westward from the Niemen river and the Germans are fighting a rear guard action. Only at one point is the German attack being seriously pressed—against the fortress of Oswowet.

To the south, according to a Berlin dispatch, the Germans have evacuated Myzzyne, which is right on the east Prussian border, northwest of Lomza.

EMBASSY READY TO MOVE

Germany Asks United States to
Guard Interests in Turkey.

Washington.—Germany has asked the United States to care for its diplomatic interests in Constantinople should the allied forces occupy the capital of Turkey. Ambassador Morgenthau has been instructed to assume that duty when the German minister to Turkey leaves with the Ottoman government for Esikicheir, the newly-selected temporary capital for the porte. The minister is arranging to place the German legation in charge of the American ambassador.

There is every indication from the official dispatches received here both at the Turkish embassy and the Washington government that the Ottoman forces have made extensive preparations to defend all approaches to Constantinople.

3 MORE FORTS ARE SILENCED IN STRAITS

London.—Three more strong forts in the inner straits of the Dardanelles have been silenced by the Anglo-French fleet after terrific bombardment, according to an official communication given out by the British Admiralty.

It is admitted in the official report that a majority of the war vessels engaging the forts by entering the straits have been hit, some of them numerous times. Serious damage is denied.

The Turkish official report declares that one British battleship has been badly damaged and that a French armored cruiser has been put out of action. None of the batteries has been damaged, says this report.

Damage by the forts which have been replying vigorously to the assaults of the fleet has not been confined to the vessels, as several seaplanes, acting as scouts for the Anglo-French fleet, have been brought down.

The admiralty describes the damage to this arm of the service in detail, saying one aviator was hit 28 times by shots from the forts. No death has resulted in the aerial squadron, however, according to the report.

The warships are now engaged in reducing the forts in the Narrows, which is considered the most difficult section of the Dardanelles, from the point of view of an attacking force.

Galloway Reappointed Commissioner.

Salem, Or.—The governor, secretary of state and state treasurer unanimously reappointed Charles V. Galloway state tax commissioner. Mr. Galloway is a democrat and has held the office since its creation in 1909, the law providing that the two appointive commissioners shall be of different political affiliation.
