Noe and Smith held for Grand Jury

For some time past Gold Hill has been subjected to various deceptions ranging from small articles to a nearly new Ford car, owned by D. H. Miller. The California-Oregon Power company missed some considerable quantity of copper wire and C. W. Martin determined to make a raid, in view of current rumors to the effect that the Noe building held a questionable contents.

On Monday, he and Prosecuting Attorney Kelly, accompanied by Sheriff Singler and Deputy Sheriff "Curly" Wilson, raided the Noe second-hand store at noon. This was a complete surprise to the inmates. Mr. Kelly took his position at the front door, Deputy Wilson at the back. Noe tried to escape and was pursued as far as the swinging bridge by Deputy Wilson, captured and disarmed. His accomplice, Bob Smith, offered no resistance when discovered hidden in a closet. A search disclosed a pit beneath the store which, it is believed by the officers, was used as a place in which to burn insulation from copper wire and also possibly to do winter fitting in. A large hook connected to a gaspipe about sixteen feet long was discovered. This, it is thought, was used to lower and raise wire secreted in a pit in Rogue river.

In a small cottage adjacent to the high school building was found the engine, tires, etc., of the dismantled Ford—everything but the top and body being located. The motor from the Sleepy Hollow ranch was also unearthed and quantities of copper wire, plate and parts of machinery stolen from Ashland mine, where hundreds of dollars worth of other equipment was destroyed by the vandals in search for copper.

Shipping receipts for 1000 pounds of copper wire and letters pertaining to the sale of the Ford and other articles found. Noe and Smith were given a hearing before Justice of the Peace Taylor and bound over to the Grand Jury on \$2000 bonds and are now in the County jail.

At first Noe pretended to be insane but finally decided to make a complete confession. Thursday he was brought to Gold Hill, upon his promise to locate the body of D. H. Miller's car. This he did, showing the Sheriff and "the owner" where he had burned all the inflammable

parts and afterwards lowered the remaining metal into the river.

Mrs. Noe has the sympathy of the entire community, the whole denouncement coming as a great shock to her. Mr. Noe having dealt in second hand goods and junk for some years she had not the slightest suspicion that any of the goods stored about the place were come by otherwise than honestly.

Being unable to raise bail, Noe and Smith will await trial in the county jail.
