The last Legislature passed a very stringent law regulating the making and sale of Dairy and Creamery butter. Under a recent ruling of State Dairy Commissioner Miehkle, all butter is required to be wrapped securely in a paper wrapper or other suitable container that will not taint the contents. Every such package must have the name of the maker printed on the outside with special butter wrapper ink, that will not go thru the paper and damage the contents. Many farmers have used rubber stamps and a composition of padding ink that in many cases penetrates the paper covering of the butter and renders the contents unfit for food. Butter in such a condition is dangerous to the consumer and if found by the State Inspector will render the farmer or retailer subject to a heavy fine and imprisonment. All consumers of Dairy butter so wrapped and stamped should not fail to realize that such ink is a deadly poison and may cause serious results. Ask your grocer for the butter with the printed wrapper and be safe.

Old Veteran Killed

Last Thursday night 12:55, Archibald McN. Harrison, was struck and instantly killed by a northbound train on the S. P. line about 2 miles South of Wilbur. Deceased was first seen by the engineer, J. C. Hume about 400 yards away. He appeared not to hear the whistle and was walking towards the coming train. The body was thrown some distance to the left of the track and was in horrible shape when viewed by the train crew who proceeded on their way after noting that the man was dead. N. T. Jewett, the Coroner was notified and empanelled a jury who found it a clear case of accident. The body was taken to Roseburg for interment. The old man had recently been taken to the Old Soldiers Home by his local relatives who were present at the funeral. The old gentleman was well known here and his death was a shock to all. His history is as follows. Born May 24th 1832 in Holmes County, Ohio, died April 27th aged 84 years. married twice, leaves 12 children living. He was one of the old Oregon Pioneers and had fought in Indian War. He came to Gold Hill in 1911 and resided here until April 18th last when he left for the Home. The funeral was held at Roseburg, April

29th and the body laid to rest among his comrades in the Soldiers cemetery. He had been a member of the Christian Church since 1866. Those who attended the services were Mrs. Mollie Harrison, daughter in law, of Gold Hill, Mrs. Joseph Fifield and daughter Neta of Portland, and Frank Harrison of Roseburg. Grant Harrison a son at Gold Hill was ill in bed and could not attend. The passing of this old veteran will no doubt recall to the mind of his former comrades many little deeds of kindness that came to them from his hands. His was a life that was well spent and his children will have many things to cherish in the memory of a loving Father and a loyal citizen. "Dum Tacet Clamat".
