

### Notice of School Meeting.

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 57 of Jackson County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said District will be held at Gold Hill High School on the 28th day of October, 1916, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 19th, 1916, and ending on June 18th 1917, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district:

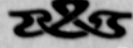
Grandma Colburn, of Rogne River, is still in a very serious condition.
