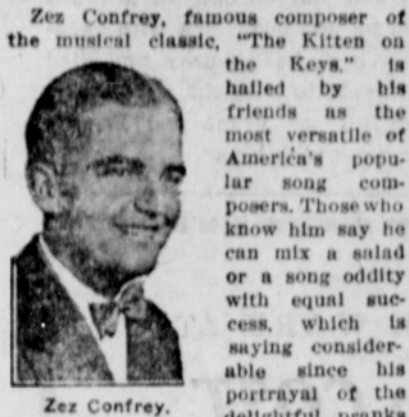


ZeZ Confrey Mixes Salads and Songs



ZeZ Confrey.

ZeZ Confrey, famous composer of the musical classic, "The Kitten on the Keys," is hailed by his friends as the most versatile of America's popular song composers. Those who know him say he can mix a salad or a song oddity with equal success, which is saying considerable since his portrayal of the delightful pranks of a certain young feline tripping over the ivories has been recognized as the model of American syncopation.

But Mr. Confrey has other "tricks" in his repertoire, his acquaintances declare. Country bred, he is a judge of horse flesh, and also knows a good cigar.

The simple life is Mr. Confrey's idea of happiness. Every so often Manhattan gets too crowded for him and he boards a train for the country and the companionship of a certain murmuring brook. Inevitably he comes back with one of the merry tunes for which he is noted.

A bachelor, ZeZ keeps open house for his friends. If he invites a few of the boys over for a midnight supper, he does the cooking himself. Invitations to his lively little dinners are sought after. There are two dishes to which Mr. Confrey is partial. So are his friends. His recipes for the two follow:

Royal Eggs With Mushroom Sauce.
12 eggs
Salt
Pepper
1/2 pound mushrooms
1 slice pimiento
2 tbsp. butter
12 slices toast

1 1/2 cup evaporated milk diluted with water
1 1/2 cup meat stock
(This may be prepared from bouillon cubes)
2 tbsp. butter
2 tbsp. flour
Parsley

Saute the mushrooms in two tbsp. butter, taking care not to burn, make a white sauce of two tbsp. butter, flour, evaporated milk and meat stock. Cook five minutes. Add the cooked mushrooms and chopped pimiento. Break eggs and drop into hot fat, being careful to keep egg in a globular mass. Just as soon as they are a golden brown lift out and drain. Place an egg on each piece of toast. Allow two pieces for each serving. Pour over all the mushroom sauce and garnish with parsley.

Pineapple-Cheese Salad.
10 slices pineapple
1 cup cream
1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 tbsp. evaporated milk
Crisp lettuce leaves
1 tsp. pineapple juice
1 tsp. sugar
Green and red mangoes
Creamy salad dressing

Combine the cheese, nuts, evaporated milk, pineapple juice and sugar, and blend into a smooth mass. Cut pineapple circles in half. Spread cheese mixture on a slice of pineapple and press the other half circle of pineapple on top of cheese as one would a slice of bread in making a sandwich. Cut diamonds or triangles from green and red mangoes and press into the edge of the cheese mixture between the pineapple. Lay two of the prepared pieces of pineapple on a crisp lettuce leaf. Serve with creamy salad dressing. This serves five.

C. A. Peterson, W. Martineau, A. E. Kellogg and E. Derwent visited Engineer Ryno and Dr. Parker at the Pleasant Creek mines last Tuesday and report considerable activity there in prospecting and engineering work preparatory to putting that proposition into operation. A great deal of machinery is reported to have already been ordered including three units of Oil floatation for concentrating the ore. This proposition is a mountain of granite averaging \$5.00 per ton in gold as well as numerous other metals not mentioned by our informant.

The Kel-Mar-Pet mine is steadily extending their tunnel toward the 800 foot mark. Following a pay vein into the mountain and at the same time cross-cutting many ledges of good ore, this mine is beginning to look like the development of a mine in the full extent of the word. By being a 'Mine' does not necessarily imply that a rich prospect is or is not a mine, but when engineers pronounce a mine "A Mine" they mean "there is sufficient ore blocked out by drifting under, over and through so that an accurate measure can be made, and that a mill can be operated economically at a sufficient margin of profit for many years. We believe the Kel-Mar prospect tunnel is in a formation that will permit of drifting on the ledges uncovered to measure up a sufficient tonnage to make a real mine and a good profit on the investment.

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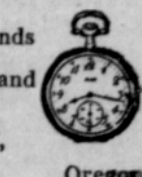
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
