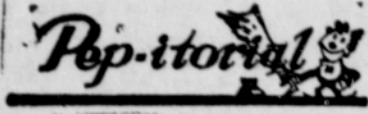

U of O RETURNS FROM BARNSTORMING TRIP

The Oregon Basketball team returned to the campus last week end from a barnstorming tour of California during which nine victories were taken from representative southern quintets. The team left immediately after Christmas, and has had but one off night in ten days. They ended their string of victories last week end by beating the strong Marysville, California, team 52 to 25, making 25 points in the last eight minutes.

Oregon's veteran trio of hoop luminaries have seintillated in the southland. Roy Okerburg, Al Westergren, and Jerry Gunther are the trinity which has accounted for most of the heavy scoring of the Webfoots. A group of sophomores round out the Oregon team which is expected to repeat its performance of last year when ten straight conference games were won in the north. Westergren and Guther made the first all-coast hoop five picked by J. Fred Bohler, the official selector, last spring, and Okerberg was named the second quintet. Westergren plays guard, Guther forward and Okerburg center.

The super-varsity squad which

has been working in Eugene during the absence of the regulars will join the varsity, and the combined aggregation will work toward the Pacific university game which will open

the home season January 15. Ray Edwards, reserve center who was injured before the holidays, has almost recovered and will again don a uniform.

Farm Pointers

In growing Oregon strawberries the cultural practices which varied the most widely are frequently, depth of cultivation, according to reports by the experiment station. Some plantings are cultivated 4 or 5 times, others as many as 18 times in a single season. Some are cultivated very shallow, some very deep, and others at all distances between. Prevailing of deep cultivation at least at some time of the year was found to be responsible for much damage to the roots.

On many Oregon streams at least enough electric power may be developed to run a 2 to 5 horse power plant, says the farm mechanics department of the state college. This is enough power for the average farm. In exceptional cases it is possible to supply a plant to provide a current to run 50 to 100 lights, run a washing machine, ironer, vacuum cleaner, electric fan, toaster, percolator, sewing machine, a cooking range, and other like equipment. Before any site is developed it is best to find out whether it can be made profitable.

Since adults of the strawberry crown borer that damages Oregon crops frequent flowers, feeding on the honey, the experiment station department of entomology is trying out a series of tests to see if it can be controlled by a poison bait.

In planning the Oregon poultry farm four things are mentioned by the experiment station department for consideration by the prospective poultry-men community development, type of soil, cost of land, markets. It is a great advantage to lo-

cate in a community where many neighbors are interested in the industry. Aside from similar interests are financial advantages in lower prices for feed, supplies and equipment. The best soil is a sandy loam that while producing good crops will not puddle in winter and bake in summer. Heavy clay land is not so good, but can be used successfully, as the college has proven.

It is a mistake to think that Oregon clover will succeed on poor soil, says the experiment station. Clover needs to make a large growth and make it rapidly, so requires available fertility. It is noticeable that clover growing on land that produced other good crops succeeds well.

Symphyliid injury to plant is so obscure as to escape detection, reports the Oregon experiment station. Plants form seeds planted fail planted fail to appear above the ground or newly sprouted plants wither and die. When this condition is caused by symphyliids the attack is generally fatal to the stand. Effective control has not developed but frequent stirring of the soil with the cultivator or hoe is said to have value. Sulfur planted with the seed is thought to act as a repellent.

To make fancy butter deliver cream to the factory three times a week in winter and four times in summer, says an O. A. C. creamery report. No one can make fancy butter from old cream. Regardless of how sweet it may be, regard two to three days old will make 92-93 score butter, cream three to four days 91-

92 score butter, four to five days 90-91 score butter. Butter that scores under 92 causes a loss that might be prevented.

According to bugets of some eastern Oregon sheep growers a band of sheep is expected to return to the owner \$8.00 a ton for hay, \$1.62 for range, 8% on live stock investment, current wages for labor, and about 40cents a head additional. If the grower owns the ewes outright grows his hay, owns his pasture, and does his own work the items of these budgets come into his own pocket. If he borrows the money to buy the ewes, buy the hay, rents the range and his labor 40 cents a head is all that is coming to him. This is for average conditions and there are possibilities of doing a great deal better or worse.

The Oregon ground squirrel occurs under favorable conditions in almost unbelievable numbers says the college extension service. In the semi-arid districts it shares with other species of ground squirrels the curious summer aestivation and winter hibernation common to many animals. The best season for poisoning is early in spring soon after the squirrels are out and become active. When the females and young are above ground, late in May and June they are readily poisoned.

Warming Foods for Cold Days

Some people suffer from cold partly because they do not eat properly. Certain foods will generate heat and thicken the blood. Such are the foods for which I am giving the recipes below. Every one of them has been tested by me in my own kitchen.

Vegetable Soup

Vegetable soup when properly made is an excellent heat-creating food. It is made from three pounds of beef or shin, one medium-sized can of tomatoes, three large carrots, three onions, one large white turnip, one white potato and about ten cents worth of soup greens. Over the dried vegetable and the piece of each pound of meat, and season to taste. Bring the soup to a quick boil then let simmer for three or four hours, skimming it from time to time. I do not strain the soup the first day, but serve it with vegetables and bits of meat as the main dish. The rest of the meal includes pie and cheese, and coffee.

I serve pilot crackers or hot biscuits with this instead of plain bread.

An Old Friend in New Dress

The next day for variation, the left-over vegetable soup is strained. Take two teaspoonfuls of marrow from the soup bones, chop in fine; add one-half cupful of fine bread crumbs, the same quantity of cream or milk, one hard-boiled egg, chopped, one teaspoonful of finely chopped parsley, and salt and pepper to taste. The mixture is made into tiny balls, which are served two or three in each plate of the clear soup.

Another Old Friend

The left-over soup meat makes excellent beef pie. I cut the meat into small cubes and add vegetables. Thicken two or three cupfuls of the vegetable soup or stock, pour it over the meat and vegetables, let simmer for fifteen minutes, place in a large deep pie-plate or individual pie-plates, cover with pie crust, and bake in the oven for twenty or twenty-five minutes at a temperature of 400 degrees Fahrenheit.
