KINCAID WINS IN GOLD HILL DANCE LAW TEST CASE

It has been a long time since Lucius Kincaid was arrested for operating a dance hall without a license in Gold Hill. Prominent Man Dies Here At Home Sunday

"Jimmie" Burns, prominent local citizen and for many years a town character, known and liked by everyone—with a joke and a cheery greeting—died at his home, in this city, Sunday at about 80 years of age.

Mr. Burns has always enjoyed good health until a few weeks ago when he was taken with pneumonia. He was cared for by Mrs. J. W. Bryan until he had recovered enough to return home. He suffered a relapse and died, Sunday morning.

Little is known of Mr. Burns' early life for he left no relatives and he was a grown man when he arrived in the Oregon country. He was born in Meo county Ireland, and came to this country at about 14 years of age and settled in Pennsylvania where he lived for about 12 years, coming to southern Oregon and took up mining on the Illinois and applegate rivers. He became a member of the Jacksonville lodge of Odd Fellows 50 years ago. The funeral services were held at the Odd Fellows hall, Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 with the Gold Hill and Jacksonville lodges in charge. Burial was in the Rock Point cemetery.
