Picnic Time

The picnic season is a joyous time for all. 'Tis the time to be prepared so that at practically a moment's notice one can pack a tasty lunch. The main idea is to have the food on hand and other items to go with it.

Purchase plenty of paper napkins. Oiled paper. Paper plates. Paper forks. Paper spoons. Have a shelf ready with: Jelly and jam. Cheese. Bottled goods. Salad dressing. And—have plenty of eggs or cold meat in the ice box.

Paper Napkin Uses

Buy plenty of cheap napkins. Hang some near sink. Use to wipe hands; wipe floor; wipe stove; wipe spots; wipe greasy pans, and be handy to wrap food in when necessary.

How to Cook Rhubarb

Method: Wash rhubarb. Cut up and place in double boiler. Add sugar. A tiny pinch of soda if desired—no water. Cook until tender.

BAKING HINTS

Roast meat or bake loaf the day before if you are planning to use it for sandwiches. It makes them far more palatable and tasty.

Blueberry Muffins or Cake

4 pint of sifted flour (2 cups). Pinch of salt. 2 teaspoons of baking powder. 1/4 cup of butter. 1/2 cup of sugar. 1 egg. 1 cup of milk. 1 heaping cup of blueberries. Method: Melt butter in baking pan while oven is heating. Beat egg. Add sugar and salt. Then add flour and baking powder sifted together. Next add milk. Mix well. Flour blueberries and add last. Pour into cake pan or muffin pans and bake twenty minutes to one-half hour.

Sour milk may be used with 1/2 teaspoon soda instead of baking powder. To make extra good, beat yellow and white separately. Put beaten white in last before berries.

COOKING HINTS

Potato Salad

Cold boiled potatoes. 3 slices of bacon. Teaspoon of flour. Small 1/2 cup of diluted cider vinegar. Chopped onions. Salt and pepper to taste. Method: Cut up potatoes. Cut up bacon in small cubes. Fry bacon crisp. Remove bacon and make a sauce by mixing flour in hot fat until smooth. Then add vinegar. Mix well. Pour over potatoes. Add bacon, onion, salt and pepper. Serve immediately.

Only tender, sweet varieties of corn are suitable for canning, says the school of home economics, O. S. C. One of the first essentials is that it be very fresh. It may be cut from the cob without precooking if the homemaker is careful. Make a sweet brine using 1 cup sugar and 4 tablespoons salt to 1 gallon water. Cover the corn with this, bring to a good boil, and while still very hot fill loosely into boiled, hot jars. Place immediately in pressure cooker and process pints 80 minutes and quarts 85 minutes at 250 degrees F. Cool the cooker very slowly.

It is unsafe to home can non-acid foods such as beans, corn, peas, beets, asparagus, spinach and other vegetables except tomatoes, and meats or fish by any other than the pressure cooker method, says the school of home economics, Oregon State college. Research and practical experience show that these foods cannot be safely canned by heating in boiling water. The deadly bacillus botulinus has been known to resist boiling, a temperature of 212 degrees F, for more than 6 hours.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

Pursuant to law, and in accordance with the order of the Board of Directors of the Gold Hill Irrigation District, duly made and entered in the minutes of said Board on the 7th day of July, 1931, said Board of Directors of the said Gold Hill Irrigation District hereby give notice that an election is hereby called to be held and will be held within said District on the 20th day of August 1931, for the purpose of determining whether said District shall issue its bonds under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 357 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1917, and Acts Amending thereof, and the Resolution calling this election for the purpose of refunding the present outstanding bonded obligations of the Gold Hill Irrigation District, said bonds to be in an amount of not to exceed \$61,850.00; said bonds shall be numbered consecutively commencing with number 1 and following in numerical order; said bonds shall be negotiable in form and payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness or in its equivalent; said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of January and July of each year, the principal and interest payable at the places to be designated respectively in the bonds and coupons; said bonds shall each be of denominations not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$1000.00; shall be signed by the President and Secretary, and the seal of the Board of Directors shall be affixed thereto and each bond shall bear on the back thereof the registration certificate of the County Treasurer who shall sign as County Treasurer and as Ex-officio Treasurer of the District. Coupons for interest shall be attached to each bond and shall be signed with the engraved facsimile signature of the Secretary, and for the further purpose of determining whether or not said bonds, as aforesaid, shall mature in accordance with the following schedule, to-wit:

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NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the City of Gold Hill on Wednesday, the 19th day of August, 1931, as in the following resolution provided.

RESOLUTION

The people of the City of Gold Hill do resolve as follows, and be it resolved by the council of the City of Gold Hill, Jackson County, Oregon, that the following proposed amendments to the charter of said city be and the same hereby are proposed for submission to the legal voters of said city for their adoption or rejection at the special city election to be held on the 19th day of August, 1931, as in this resolution provided:

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

AN ACT
To amend an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the town of Gold Hill, in the County of Jackson, State of Oregon," approved by the Governor February 12, 1895, as amended by the legislative assembly by an act approved February 7, 1899, as amended by the legal voters at an election held April 13, 1907, as amended by the legal voters at an election held April 18, 1921, as amended by the legal voters at an election held July 6, 1926, and to amend all other amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people. Be it enacted by the people of the City of Gold Hill that an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the town of Gold Hill, in the County of Jackson, State of Oregon," approved by the Governor February 12, 1895, as amended by the legislative assembly by an act approved February 7, 1899, as amended by the legal voters at an election held April 13, 1907, as amended by the legal voters at an election held April 18, 1921, as amended by the legal voters at an election held July 6, 1926, and as amended by all other amendments enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people, be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto Chapter Six A, to read as follows:

SECTION 1. The Council of the City is authorized to extend the terms of that agreement dated October 19, 1926, between the City and Beaver Portland Cement Company for a further term of five (5) years. All the terms and conditions in said agreement shall remain in force and effect for a further term of five (5) years upon the signing of said agreement of extension. Said agreement was authorized at an election on July 6, 1926, when the voters voted to accept the proposition of said company reading as follows:

The Beaver Portland Cement Company makes this offer for the leasing and purchase of the City's hydro-electric power site, plant and equipment, and all of the City's right title, and interest in and to all land lying

on the west bank of Rogue River, between the Pacific Highway bridge and the City boundary, and between the River and Sams Valley Highway; also all water rights owned by the City; the city to lease said properties to this company for a term of five years at a rental of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) per month, with an option to purchase said properties at any time during the term of the lease for a price of \$22,600; or at the option of the city, this company will agree to pay an amount of money sufficient to complete the payment of the principal amount of bonds outstanding, issued by the city to purchase said property, and to pay all interest thereon due on said bonds; all money paid as rental to apply on purchase price at the time the option may be exercised. The option to provide for giving good title to said properties.

The Company may defend title to all properties in the City's name, but the expense thereof will be borne by the Cement Company.

The lease to be and become absolutely void if, on account of legal difficulties, this company is unable to develop or operate the power properties for the purpose for which the lease is made, or should there be a failure to obtain water rights for at least 1,347 second feet of water, including the City's water rights on the west bank of the river and the water rights of the Braden and McClure ditch, provided such failure shall not entitle the Cement Company to the return of any rent.

This company to agree to supply, pump, and deliver into the City's mains at the pumping plant, free of charge, all water which may be required for domestic and municipal uses.

When present plant is in operation such power as now consumed by the City for municipal lighting will be furnished free, and upon the development of a larger power plant the Company will furnish electric power to the City to an amount of twenty kilowatts for municipal use only and free of charge. At that time, should any additional power be required for municipal lighting and power, same will be supplied by the Company at one cent per kilowatt hour.

Should the Cement Company at any time fail to live up to the various clauses of this offer, and any agreement made pursuant thereto, such action will constitute a forfeiture, and property and plant will revert to the City.

Due to litigation and other events beyond the control of either party,

the terms of said agreement could not be carried out, and said agreement should be so extended for five (5) years. Full power to enter into and carry out said agreement leasing the properties set forth in said offer, with an option to purchase the same, is hereby given the Council.

Resolved further, that this resolution for proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council be filed with the Recorder of the City of Gold Hill for submission to the legal voters of said City for their rejection or approval, to be voted upon at a special election to be held as herein provided.

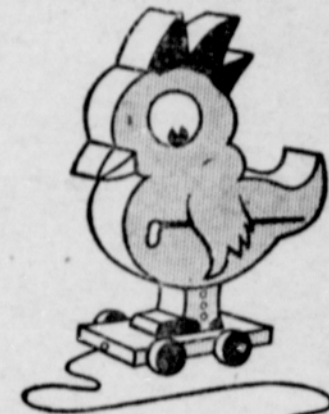
Resolved further, that the Council deems it advisable and does hereby and herein call and make necessary provision for the holding of a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 19th day of August, 1931, between the legal voting hours on said date, and that said time be and the same hereby is designated as the time for holding said special election, and the City Hall in said City is hereby designated as the polling place thereof, and the following named persons are hereby designated and appointed as and for the Judges and Clerks of said election, to-wit: Fred G. Turner and M. B. Merriman, judges, and Mrs. Millie Walker and Mrs. Ester Gilchrist, clerks.

Be it further resolved that the Recorder be and he is hereby instructed to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters in the manner provided by law; that is to say, by publication of this resolution in full with the ballot title therefor not less than ten (10) days before the date of the said special election, in the Gold Hill News, a newspaper printed in said city, and of general circulation therein, and the Recorder shall also post similar copies of such notice in three (3) public places in said city, and the Chief of Police shall post one (1) of said notices at the City Hall, the same being the place of election, at least ten (10) days before said election date.

The ballot title for said amendment is as follows: CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

To amend the charter of the City of Gold Hill, Oregon; by adding thereto Chapter Six A authorizing the Council to extend for five years the agreement for a lease and option to purchase the City hydro-electric properties, with Beaver Portland Cement Company, authorized at an election July 6, 1926, and authorizing such leasing and sale.

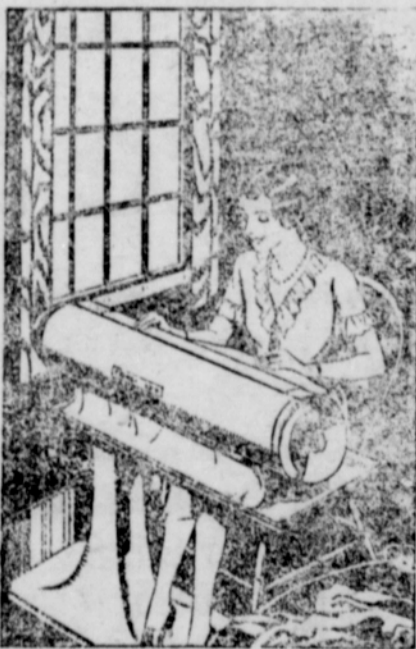
