Ski Meet at Fort Klamath in February To Be Big Event

Early plans of the Crater Lake ski club of Fort Klamath indicate the possibility of reducing the distance of the annual ski race to Crater Lake to 34 miles, when the club holds its big meet next February, attracting some of the most skilled winter sportsmen in the land, in addition to several thousand spectators from all parts of the coast. The race hitherto had covered a distance of 42 miles from Fort Klamath to the lake and return.

The start and finish line will probably be located next year at the site of the meet five miles north of Fort Klamath where a ski jump and toboggan slide are now being completed. According to Alfred B. (Tony) Castel, club official who expects one of the most successful meets in the history of the club.

Alf Ostmo, Klamath Falls, a recent arrival from Scandinavia, has announced his intention of participating in the jumping events and has visited Fort Klamath several times since deep snow arrived to begin training activities. He is capable of jumping over 150 and has captured numerous prizes in his native country.

Quite a number of entrants are expected for the 52 mile race, the feature of 20 events sponsored by the club, offering competition for young and old, ranging from grammar school children to adults. A silver loving cup will be presented to the winner of each outstanding event and will necessitate the distribution of 15 cups. A new, large silver trophy will be presented the winner of the long race, immediately upon reaching the finish line. It must be won twice before any one participant can claim permanent possession.

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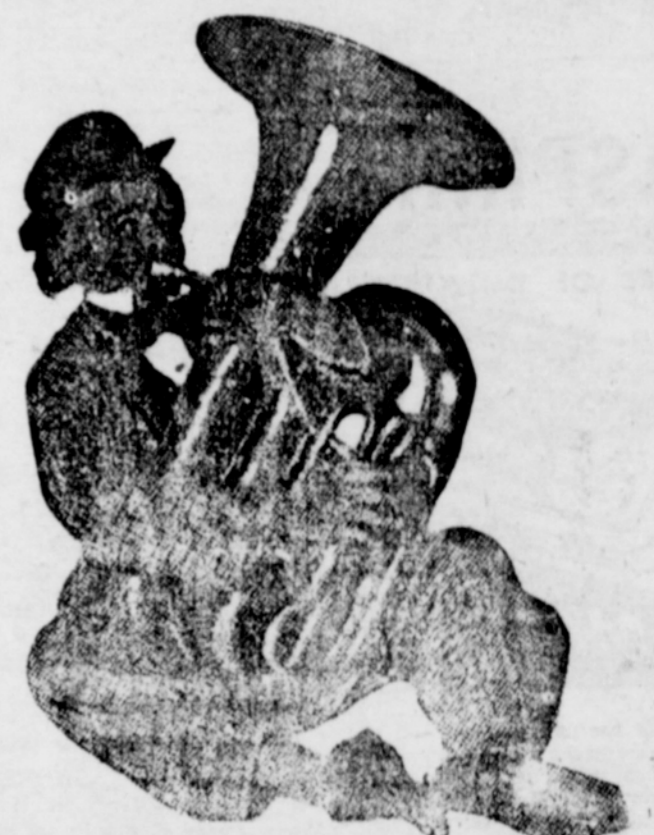
