

Ski Meet At Mount Shasta To Be Held Saturday and Sunday

Alf Engen's record ski jump of 239 feet made at Big Pines last winter has been approved recently by the Western America Winter Sports Association. This association sponsors ski jumpers who will appear Saturday and Sunday, January 23 and 24 at Mount Shasta, California at Snowman's Hill. Among these jumpers are Alf Engen, Sverre Engen, Ainar Fredbo, Ted Rex, Stephen Trogstad, Halvor Hvalstad, Lars Haugen, Sigurd Ulland and Alf Mathiesen.

This will be the first attempt by any organization in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland to bring famous ski artists and jumpers to this area. These jumpers have international reputations and are fearless, highly skilled and daring. Sigurd Ulland, who is the professional attached to the Mount Shasta Snowmen and now on tour over the western portion of the United States representing that organization, has been runner-up to the U. S. professional champion in all tournaments this season. Engen recently jumped 239 feet at Salt

On the evening of the 23rd there will be a Snowman's dance at the Weed hippodrome. The famous ski jumpers will be guests and introduced; many celebrities will be in the party.

On Oregon Farms

HOOD RIVER—Indications that the famous Hood River apples may in the not distant future give place to pears as a major crop of the county are found in summaries of an orchard census begun in 1930 by County Agent A. L. Marble. To date 408 farms have been covered, and a heavy trend toward pears has been found. Mr. Marble believes that pear shipments may exceed apples within a few years. Cherry planting has shown the greatest percentage increase.

CANYON CITY—Farmers of the Prairie City district seem to be gradually shifting from Victory oats to the Markton variety. Victory oats have given exceedingly good yields, but during the past two years have been late in maturing, and it is hoped that the Markton variety will take care of this deficiency. County Agent R. G. Johnson recently obtained three tons of this variety to distribute among J. S. Guttridge, Prairie City; Dick Shouten, Fox Valley; Julius Shields, Long Creek; C. M. Johnson, Hamilton, and Dick Musgrave, Top. Plans for ordering another truck load are under way.

ROSEBURG—Systematic thinning out of the terminal branches in bearing orchards was advised by O. T. McWhorter, Oregon state college extension horticulturist, who demonstrated and discussed pruning pears for profitable production at a demonstration meeting held in the Paul Helweg orchard recently. This is one of a series of meetings which included the farms of Fred Weatherly, Kellog; H. F. Hebard, Umpqua; Willard Smith, Glide; Otto Walker, Coos Junction, and Abner Iogsdon, Riddle. A system of training prune trees for profitable production and the im-

portance of orchard cover crops were also considered.

Bridge Over Rogue On Coast Hiway Completed

The new bridge over the Rogue river on the Coast highway near Gold Beach is completed and open for traffic. All that remains is to complete the shoulders on the approaches and to clean up around the new structure.

A big celebration is being planned for the dedication of the bridge which will be held sometime in May.

Gervais—City voted to build city hall and auditorium to cost \$4,000.

Medford—People's Electric Store will remodel store room at 212 West Main street.

Roseburg—Building permits issued in this city during 1931 totaled \$41,190.

Astoria—Building permits total for city in 1931 was \$544,435, as compared to \$95,001 in 1930.

Westlake—Road from this place to highway to be graded.

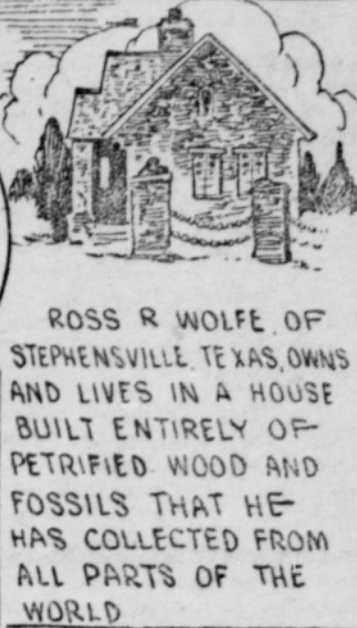
Willamina—Telephone Co. installed booth in Willamina restaurant.
