"CECIL WOLFER" PROVES TO BE DOUGLAS FUGITIVE

The man who was arrested at Albany recently under the name of Cecil Wolfer, charged with forgery at Glendale, has been proved to be Edward L. Nole, who escaped from a Douglas county prisoners' road gang in February. Using the name of Wolfer, that of a former county prisoner, Noel forged the signature of the manager of a local lumber company to a check for \$30. He was arrested in Albany and brought back to Roseburg last Saturday by Deputy Sheriff George Olinghouse, of Glendale.

Noel's previous arrest, late in 1931, was on a charge of larceny. As a member of a road gang composed of county prisoners, last February 11, he slipped into the brush and escaped.

mouth of the mighty Rogue, the ocean and the green-clad slopes of the mountains.

The structure weighs 63,706,000 pounds or 31,853 tons. It contains 15,730 cubic yards of concrete and 965 tons of steel!

The bridge was built by the Oregon State highway department in cooperation with the United States bureau of roads, and under the supervision of Roy E. Klein, former state highway engineer; C. B. McCulloch, state bridge engineer, and William Lynch, district engineer for the United States bureau of roads. A. L. Gemeny, bridge expert of the United States bureau of roads was in the field during a large part of time the bridge was under construction. Marshall Dresser was resident engineer.

Construction of the bridge was started in March 1930, and it was finished in January this year. During the height of its construction, 175 men were employed. The total cost of the bridge including approaches was approximately \$625,000. The Mercer-Fraser company of Eureka, California was the contractor.
