

"Pioneer Mother" Statue To Be Unveiled at Eugene

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 26—The serene end of life, as she looks back on the great good that has been accomplished is depicted in A. Phimister Proctor's conception of the "Pioneer Mother," to be unveiled at the University of Oregon on the afternoon of May 7. The statue will honor the mother of Burt Brown Barker, vice president of the University, who is giving the statue to the institution. Mrs. Barker was an old pioneer of Oregon, for many years a resident of Salem.

The pioneer mother has been honored many times in art and story, but almost always she has been pictured at the time of her struggle, during the hardships of the trail. Mr. Barker first thought of showing her at the time of her life when her struggles were over, and when he presented this idea to Mr. Proctor it found instant favor, and this statue is the result.

Mothers of Oregon students, old pioneers of Oregon and many others will be guests of the University at the unveiling ceremony on the south campus. Following the short program, will be a banquet at McArthur court. In the evening will be held the canoe fete, the first beautiful event of Junior Week-end, which is to be held at the same time. Mothers and pioneers have been issued a special invitation to attend all the Junior Week-end activities.

Hood River—State street being repaired.

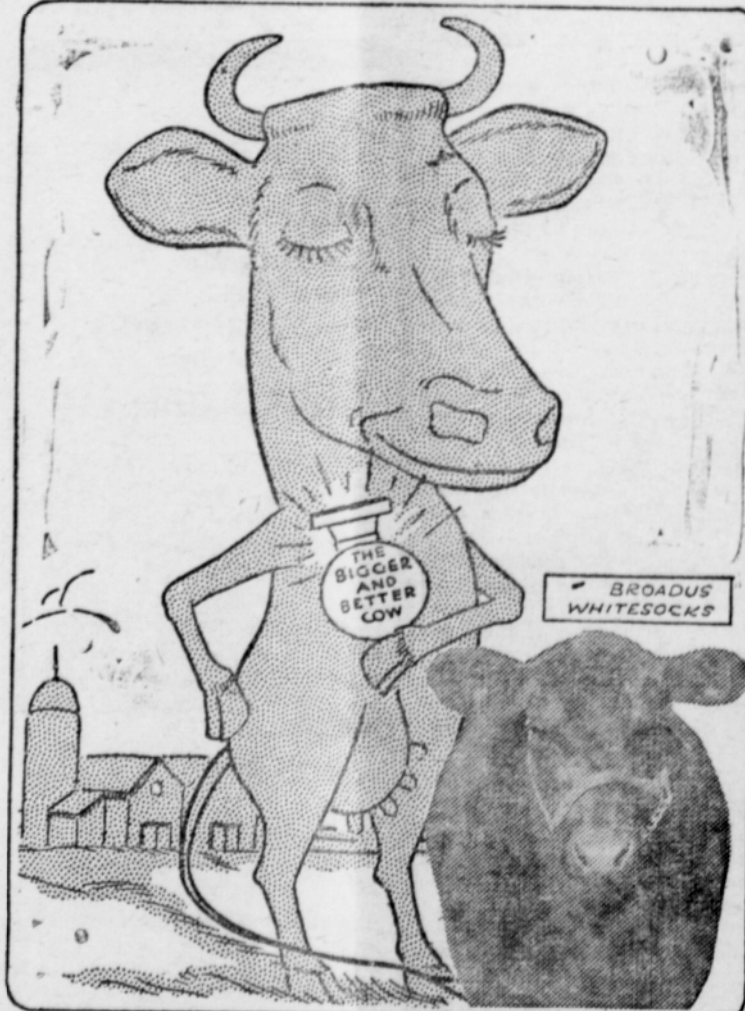
Jackson County Asks Josephine To Pay Mrs. Martin Bill

Jackson county officials insist that Josephine county pay the hospital bill of Mrs. Harry Martin of Grants Pass, who was injured March 29 in an automobile accident between Gold Hill and Central Point on the Pacific highway, according to information received by County Judge C. G. Gillette of Josephine county. Mrs. Martin is a resident of Josephine county and under the Oregon statute that county is responsible for the bill, Jackson county officials maintain.

Medford officials report that Mrs. Martin is unable to pay the hospital bill, which will be quite sizeable, as she has yet 10 weeks to spend in a plaster cast before she can be moved.

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Fashion Dictates Bossy's Figure



Time was when all a cow needed to have class in the dairy world was a pleasant disposition! A cow's figure simply didn't count!

But those days, it seems, are gone forever. And Bossy must measure up as a perfect 136 or she's out in the butter and cheese world.

Styles in dairy stock have changed completely within the last twenty-five years. This bovine fashion note is the frivolous revelation of a survey of major dairy herds of the United States received at the statistical department of the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation recently.

Many a cow, ruminating in careless neglect of proportions will have to take stock if the present trend continues, the reports indicate.

Weights and measures, breeds and requirements tabulated in state reports show that Bossy is a much more dressy creature than her homely predecessor of a decade ago. The term "cow-like" may one day mean graceful as today's vogue becomes universal.

Twenty-five years ago, the dairy cattle as well as beef cattle of this country were scrawny, muscular and awkward, the report shows. Today the herds that roam the western plains have entirely different characteristics. Cattle for both dairy and beef purposes are sleek, rounded, short-horned. The transition of dairy cow from the rangy string type to the present-day well-fed rounded animal, it seems is the result of careful breeding and intelligent selection of dairy herds through many generations of cattle.
